

However, generally it was felt that the calendar provided a good way of finding and preserving village photos, as well as informing villagers of important dates. Generally villagers seemed to like the calendar and so it was agreed that the initiative would be repeated next year, although the supply of historic photos had been largely exhausted.

Our Village Hall

This New Year starts with a village-wide debate more important than we have had for many a year - should we build a new village hall. And, if we do, who will use it, who will pay for it and, crucially, is it fair to ask all households in the village to pay for it?

Since the hall is the only public asset and meeting place within our control (the pub and church, remember are owned by individuals or other groups) getting this issue resolved will certainly be a hotly-debated topic over the next few months. We are, therefore, devoting a significant amount of space of this New Year edition to report on the Parish Council meeting held last month in which the Village Hall Committee formally presented the rationale for a new hall to councillors. In the meantime, it's worth reminding ourselves of how Shutford could bene fit from a new hall by restating the claims made for reconstruction by the VHC at a public meeting in November. They said the new building would:

- enhance the historic setting of the pub, church and manor house
- meet the needs of the village which were expressed in the village plan - 84 per cent of respondents to the questionnaire wanted the hall rebuilt or refurbished
- be used by far more people so hire fees will cover its annual running costs from year one
- become easily accessible to mothers and toddlers and the disabled - a vital plus in an age where the elderly are living longer and
- provide an environment which will be used in a whole range of new and different ways which villagers have been asking for.

Villagers to decide on new village hall funding

Shutford Parish Council has voted to put the future of our village hall in our own hands. The decision came after an hour-long presentation by the Village Hall Steering Committee and vigorous debate among the 35 plus villagers who attended the first Parish Council meeting of the New Year.

Councillors have agreed to ask households if they are prepared to fund part of the cost of a new village hall by increasing the amount paid on the parish council precept, which is paid as part of our annual council tax. If villagers want to go ahead with the new building plans the increase in precept is likely to be around £45 a year for a Band D property – only slightly more than the cost of a Mars bar a week.

The cost of a new hall is estimated at less than £300,000 and the Village Hall Committee has already received pledges for £100,000 and holds retained funds of around £25,000.

But with over 40 per cent of the money required already secured, the Parish Council were told that further fund raising is unlikely to boost this amount by more than between £25,000 and £40,000 due to the fact that alternative sources of funding for projects of this kind have been largely withdrawn by local councils.

Since the pledges, which have been secured for a new hall on the existing site, are dependent on the evidence of villager's support for the project, the Village Hall Committee had concluded that the only way to meet the villager's requests for a new or refurbished hall was by raising a Public Works Loan.

Loans of this type are already in widespread use to fund village hall construction throughout the county.

Why we need a new village hall

The Village Hall is run as a charity and the trust deed makes clear it must serve the entire community and be accessible to all. With a growing elderly population who are all living longer and a large number of young parents with toddlers, easy and safe access is a major downside for the existing structure. Disability and pushchair access and disabled facilities cannot be economically provided and it has no safe drop off point for users.

Full refurbishment of the existing hall is uneconomic. The pledges are for a new hall only which means it would cost only a little more - about £30,000 - to rebuild it entirely, leaving the next generation with lower running costs and lower maintenance costs.

Usage of the current hall is falling and it no longer covers its running costs. The deficit is made up by fund raising while villagers hire other more modern halls for parties and family events. The current financial position of the hall is not sustainable. However, villagers are clear that usage would be high if the hall was modernised, thus confirming research that rebuilt halls generate a surplus and are vibrant and active from the day they re-open.

The cost of a new hall today - £300,000 - will rise rapidly due to high building cost inflation which is currently running at between five and seven percent. This means that a new hall will cost £400,000 in only five years - a £100,000 increase that is beyond any fundraising programme we could achieve.

If we don't do it now, when will we?

"It's only a matter of time before the issue being discussed is not one about rebuilding the hall, but the problem of not having one at all".

With these words, spoken as the meeting came to a close and before councillors took their vote on next steps, one villager highlighted the reality of the present situation - doing nothing is not an option. A full structural survey of the hall in 2012 identified the need for major structural and cosmetic repairs in the short and medium term. Costings show that, without the pledged £100,000, the Village Hall Committee will have to spend over £40,000 on the asbestos roof alone. A full refurbishment would cost up to £170,000.

How do we raise this loan?

Any loan which leads to an increase in the village precept will be raised by the Parish Council only after consultation with villagers. The mechanism to be used for this consultation process is still to be established. It will be designed to establish the level of support for the loan and, as councillors made clear, to ensure all households are able to make their views known.

To keep any agreed increase as low as possible, the VHC has undertaken to continue aggressive fund raising and to involve the villagers in some of the finishing elements of the new build such as kitchen fitting and decoration.

Your investment for the future

Some villagers questioned the need for a rebuilt hall pointing out that since the existing one is not being used much, there will be no demand for a new one in the future. The difficulty some households may have in paying an increase in the precept was also to the fore of the minds of some speakers. These two issues were addressed by one resident who suggested that it might be helpful to take a more altruistic view of the need for a new hall and view it as an investment in the next generation. He said that "in the 60 years since the hall was put up the world has changed dramatically. We cannot possibly know what faces the people of Shutford in the next five or six decades but we do know that the world of work is changing rapidly. Technology is altering the prospects for jobs and incomes for everybody. The role of the community in facing this change will become more and more important," he argued concluding by saying that the provision of a comfortable place where young and old can meet should, therefore, be seen as an investment in the future, not a cost on the present.

What next?

In due course all villagers will be asked for their views on the scheme. Please use the opportunity to say what you want. Villager feedback is essential. Look out for village notices, meetings and further updates.

Dogs for the Disabled Puppy Socialiser Appeal nr Banbury

Dogs for the Disabled is appealing for volunteer puppy socialisers living near Banbury.

Patient, dog-loving members of the public are invited to apply to care for one of our pups for more than a year, helping to prepare them for their future role as an assistance dog. Volunteers help our pups grow into confident, well-behaved young dogs, comfortable in many different environments and ready to start formal training with Dogs for the Disabled trainers and instructors.

Feeding, training and caring for a puppy is a demanding, time-consuming but ultimately very rewarding role: some socialisers have looked after more than 10!



Potential volunteers are asked to email liz.stone@dogsforthedisabled.org with full contact details so that she can help them find out whether they meet the criteria for the role.

For example volunteers need to have a fully-fenced, secure garden and be able to devote several hours a day on activities to socialise the puppy. They will be asked familiarise the puppy with locations including supermarkets, schools, hospitals, dentists, buses and trains to prepare them for their working life.



The puppy can live with children aged over two years and a maximum of two existing pet dogs.

Supervised and supported by the charity's puppy coordinators, they will teach basic skills including walking on a lead, 'sit', 'down', 'wait' and 'stay' and they will also be required to attend regular puppy classes at the charity's Banbury centre. The pup's food and vet costs are paid by Dogs for the Disabled.

The volunteer's reward will be to see the young dog they return to the charity, after 6-8 months' intensive training, become a fully-qualified assistance dog partnered with a disabled adult or child and picking up dropped items, fetching the phone, loading and unloading the washing machine, calling lifts and helping them dress and undress. Some will progress to become autism assistance dogs helping a child with autism and the entire family live a calmer, less stressful life.

The Bishop of Dorchester came to Shutford on Advent Sunday for a special Benefice Service organised by Reverend Ronald. The service included a renewal of baptismal and confirmation vows during which the Bishop spoke about St Andrew. The benefice choir led the singing. A retiring collection raised £191 for the Bishop of Oxford's Outreach Fund. Many of the congregation enjoyed refreshments afterwards.

Henry the Hoover has not been returned to church. Sadly there has been a spate of thefts from churches in this area including other vacuum cleaners. On a brighter note a generous couple in the village have donated £100 and a new cleaner has been purchased. We also had offers of other vacuum cleaners to replace the lost one.

We had 20 people at Messy Church in Shutford Village Hall on 13th December. All the craft activities had a Christmas theme. We will continue to hold these events across the benefice in 2015 and they are ideal for families with younger children. The meetings will usually been held from 4.00–6.00pm on Saturdays and will finish with refreshments.

Shutford Community Association organised the village carol singing on 17th December. Daisy and Deddington Brass led the 50 or so villagers around the village. The evening finished with refreshments provided by the SCA in church. A collection of £136 has been given to the church.

Christmas Services were well attended and as usual the church was beautifully decorated by our team of florists who donate flowers all year round. It was good to have families with children in church and the Christmas Day morning service attracted the highest congregation of the year with 57 villagers and visitors to hear the Christmas story.

Attendance at the Christingle was good but the number of children coming is dwindling. There was plenty of congregation participation:

made during refreshments. £100 from the collection has been given to the Children's Society to help their work with vulnerable children.

There is a need for more people to become involved with church life, both in worship and fundraising, to help reduce the financial and work commitment of a few. Any help is always welcome and appreciated.

Thinking of money, 86% of the cost of ministry in 2014 has been covered by our regular worshippers and donors. Any additional income required to cover our total expenditure of £250 per week has come from various fund raising initiatives held during the year. There are financial pressures on everyone and we are aware that all village organisations and businesses need support, if we are to continue to thrive.

23 people attended our Autumn Lunch of homemade soup, bread and other goodies raising £123 from donations. The Christmas Draw was launched at the lunch and door to door sale of tickets in the village raised £704. This money has been used towards the church building insurance premiums. Viv Mitchell won the Christmas Hamper: a list of other prize winners is in the church porch. Among other successes in 2014 was the Illuminate and Celebrate initiative (details elsewhere in this publication) which raised £670: again thanks to all who made donations to this and support our fundraising and social occasions.

Exams? At 43? What was I thinking....? Going back to school, by Kirsten Parrish

First, a quick introduction for those new to the village and the Shutford News. My name is Kirsten Parrish. I'm 43, but feel 63 most days. I live in Church Lane with my dog, Darwin, and husband, Tom (yes, I meant to put them in that order, Darwin is here more of the time).



To cut a very long story short and at risk of boring everyone to tears, I'm

a relatively recent allotment holder (on Thistle Hill, and no, I didn't know it was called that either), and a very keen, but very, VERY amateur gardener.

After battling with more failures than successes on the allotment – but at the same time loving almost every minute of it, even manure and slug hurling – I decided to go part time at work (I'm lucky that I'm my own boss and only had to argue with myself about that for a while) and embark on a horticulture course at Pershore College. The course started in September 2014, and I promised to share my progress juggling study and running my own business with readers of the Shutford News.

By the time you read this I'll be at the end of my first theory certificate in Plant Growth, Propagation and Development, and just starting the Garden Planning, Establishment and Maintenance part of the course. I'm also underway with a certificate in Practical Horticulture, and if I pass all three will end up with a Level 2 Diploma from the Royal Horticultural Society. (Sorry, I know that's very dull for those who've heard all that before, as if it wasn't boring enough the first time around...).

Anyhow, a promise is a promise, so here's an update on how it's going! I'll also use this as an excuse to share some revision topics with you at the same time with a short quiz... and yes, there are prizes on offer!

So, what's it been like, learning again after being out of regular study for so long? In short, a lot, lot harder than I expected. For a start, I thought the course modules would be far less 'academic' than they are. How hard can gardening be?

Well, pretty tricky if you're expected to know all the botanical names of the various plant tissues within a leaf, root and stem, for example. Or give the full Latin names for 13 different conifers (they all looked pretty much the same to me before I got up close and personal with a few – sharp needles!).

I wasn't prepared for that fact I'd need to know the life cycle of a potato cyst eelworm. Not just know it, but draw it. Given that at one point the female buries its head in the host plant (potato, tomato, nightshade...) before it....."has relations with" with the male, and then stays there until a minimum of 200 "eelworms-to-be" burst out of its cyst-shaped body, that certainly has proved to be quite a challenge.

However, I have found learning again to be really exhilarating. The experience of wanting to learn because I'm choosing to do it - rather than being forced to learn because I'm young and that's just what you are told to do - is very, very different. The challenging part is that although I am understanding the lectures as we go along, and certainly learning useful things such as how to plant a tree properly, or grow new plants (propagate) from leaf cuttings, for example, retaining the information seems to be almost impossible.

That "memory issue" doesn't really matter so much in day-to-day working life, as you just get on with the task in hand and gather new information as and when you need it. However, when you are faced with the prospect of taking four exam papers in one day – and knowing you won't have Google or Wikipedia to rely on to remind you of the equations for photosynthesis, for example – it starts to get a bit worrying.

I'm doing all the right things – making notes, summarising key points on library cards, getting the long-suffering Tom to test me, making sure all the labels in every cupboard face the same way, hoovering a lot, sharpening pencils a lot more (yes, the revision-diversion tactics have stayed fresh after all those years!) – but it doesn't seem to be working. I can write notes on a card, go and make a coffee, and come back sure that they must have been ghost-written, as I don't even remember writing the notes, never mind what they say!

I keep trying to remind myself that this wasn't the point of doing the course, though. I'm doing it as I'm interested in the subject and wanted a temporary respite from hammering away at a computer all day, writing articles and presentations for construction and chemical companies. This is certainly a change from that! At the same time, it makes no sense to take on a new challenge and not want to do well, whatever it is. So it's back to the revision in between responding to clients' emails and keeping the business ticking over....

Present: Cllrs. Hancock, Parsons, Duffield and Gibbs . Cllr. Reynolds (OCC & CDC)

Cllr. Parsons was elected as Chair in the absence of a Chairman and Vice Chairman.

Two people had applied to be co-opted on to the council and Ashley Taylor was co-opted and also re elected as Chairman.

At this point there was an adjournment for the Village Hall Committee etc. to explain their request for the Council to apply for a Public Works Loan to enable the village hall to be rebuilt. If this took place it would mean an increase on each household's Council Tax. After much discussion it was agreed that the Council would agree in principle, with the proviso that more information is required and the residents of the village will have to be given a chance to decide if that is the way forward. The form of consultation will be looked into.

Highways: Certain potholes have been ringed for repair, the renewal of white lines will not take place this year for financial reasons and OCC will cut the grass verges twice and sight lines three times per year.

Red Telephone Box: This will placed at Jame Corner near the hedge which is Parish Land. This will take place later in the year.

Speed Checks: The police have been approached and there are four people on the list as volunteers.

War Memorial: A quote has been accepted for the cleaning of the memorial, and a Grant of £500 has been received, leaving a small sum for the Parish Council to pay.

Dairyground: The back of the bench has broken and so it was agreed to purchase a new bench.

Finance: The Annual Precept was discussed. The Clerks' salary will increase to £800.00. The following donations were agreed:

It was agreed to keep the Precept at £6000 for the 2015/16.year.

The Feather Forecast for Shutford:

There are 4 species of Bunting seen in the UK: Cirl, Reed, Corn & Yellow Hammer.



The Yellow Hammer male is unmistakeable with a bright yellow head and under parts, brown back streaked with black, and chestnut rump. Often seen perched on top of a hedge or bush, singing. Found all year round across the UK but are least abundant in the north and west, and absent from some upland areas. Look in open countryside with bushes and hedgerows. They feed on insects & seeds

The **Corn Bunting** is a nondescript lowland farmland bird & is the largest of the buntings. It is a stout, dumpy brown bird which flies off with a fluttering flight with its legs characteristically 'dangling'. Often seen perched prominently on a hedge, post or wire, singing its jangling song. It is seen all year round & feeds on insects & seeds.





The **Reed Bunting** is a sparrow-sized bird but slim and with a long, deeply notched tail, the male has a black head, white collar and a drooping moustache. Predominantly a farmland and wetland bird. Typically found in wet vegetation but has recently spread into farmland and, in winter, into gardens. They are seen all year round & feed on insects & seeds.

Things of interest locally:

The usual winter visitors are now all here, Redwings, Fieldfares, Pipits etc. Now's the time to put up bird boxes ready for next spring & put the feeders out. To attract different birds try putting out the food they prefer:

Nuts.... Tits, Great spotted woodpecker, nuthatch
 Sunflower Tits, Goldfinches, Chaffinch, Greenfinch
 Nyjer... Goldfinches, Tree sparrow, House sparrow

4. Suet balls... Great spotted woodpecker, Robin, Blackbird, Tits

5. Dried mealworms.. Robins, Blackbirds

6. Suet cakes.. Tits, Robins, Woodpeckers

- 2. A flight of Goshawks
- 3. A cloud of seafowl
