It would also be impossible to tear our 2 cats away...





Tuesday 14th July 2021 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall

The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

21/035	Minutes of the last meeting: It was RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 4th May 2021 were a correct record (unanimous) and signed by the Chairman.

One of the things I've done over the past month is that I've been able to visit one of our local primary schools and meet the children, on different days and times, across all of the year groups. We sat outside on the grass, under one of the large trees, and I asked them if they wanted to ask me anything, maybe what I enjoyed or what it was like being a 'vicar'? I've done this at the beginning of my ministries in each of the parishes where I've been and although it is such great fun, I also am never quite sure what I'm going to be asked next!

As some of you may be aware I worked in a primary school for almost four years before moving to be your Rector, so I'm very much used to being in a school environment. The children were brilliant and we had a great discussion, especially when I got to ask them some questions about what they liked about being at the school and about living in the local villages. A number of the children who I met live in Shutford. What was really lovely to hear and see was how much they enjoyed being together, an aspect that many of us have missed over the past year. My time working in a school last year really did show to me the huge impact that being away from their friends had on the children in the school where I worked.

I'm looking forward hopefully to being able to go into the school again in the coming weeks and months, because as many of you may also already know, I've also become one of the school governors at both of the primary schools in our benefice. A role which I take very seriously and I've been a school governor in all of the parishes where I've been the incumbent in the past. Schools, I do believe, reflect very much the community in which the children live.

As we go forward through the Summer, if you or someone you know, might like to arrange a thanksgiving for the birth of a child, a Christening or a wedding, at the church, then please do be in touch, as these important life events are once again able to happen, hopefully with less restrictions as time goes on.

May I wish you all a joy filled summer and times when you can be together and have fun, with your families and your friends.

Church news

Christian Aid Week was held 10th – 16th May: £350 (+ £50 from gift aid) was collected in Shutford which will help families to survive drought brought on by the climate crisis. 10% of households responded to the door to door envelope delivery with others donating online. All donations have been gratefully received and can still be made to the charity at caweek.org.

A Benefice online meeting was held on 26th May: items on the agenda included finance, The Wykeham Benefice News and Website and planning for the growth of church membership. The Living in Love and Faith Initiative, which deals with the inclusion and care for LGBTI+ people within the diocese, will be discussed in open meetings during the autumn. Resources draw together the bible, theology, science and history with real-life stories designed to help every Christian explore questions of identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage: details to follow. 6.00pm Sunday Evening online service will probably cease before long but the Wednesday one will continue.

A PCC meeting was held in church on 16th June which enabled members to inspect the church building and grounds and see where conservation work needs to be done. Priority work includes installation of guarding to the retaining wall by the pub, fixing gate hinge in porch and making good various areas of plaster in the church. There is nothing of major concern. Plans are also

being considered to allocate a special area in the churchyard for the interment of ashes, subject to Diocesan approval. The Harvest Thanksgiving will be on 26th September with a Supper and Sale of Produce the next day.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held in Shutford Village Hall on Tuesday, 6th July at 7.30pm. The meeting was chaired by Reverend Neil Bowler with only members of the existing PCC in attendance. Because of ongoing coronavirus regulations, we decided not to have any refreshments and any social interaction will have to wait until later in the year.

Ken Jeffs was re-elected as churchwarden for the coming year. He will be formally enrolled at a service in Deddington on 21st September. Julie Hodgkins was re-elected as Secretary and all PCC members agreed to remain.

There are vacancies for a second churchwarden and one PCC member.

The Annual Report and Accounts, which had been circulated to parishioners and supporters, were adopted and a summary was read out. Copies are also available from the churchwarden and on the Shutford Village website: copies are too large to print in this publication and may be of limited interest.

Coronavirus dominated our lives in 2020 and affected church attendance which fell by 70%. However, new forms of worship were introduced with Diocesan online Church at Home and Benefice Eucharist each Sunday via Zoom. On average, 9 people attend church on a Sunday with no significant increase for Harvest or Christmas in 2020 – the church was closed for many weeks including Easter and Remembrance Sundays. Following the retirement of Reverends Ronald and Elisabeth Hawkes in January, Reverend John Tattersall led worship during the interregnum assisted by retired clergy. Our

new Rector, Reverend Neil Bowler was appointed in September and started his ministry in January 2021. The church is supported by a small number of loyal good natured worshippers and others from the wider community who value the presence of St Martin's in the village and work to keep it open.

Despite the church being closed for many weeks and the absence of social fund raising, all our costs have been covered with a surplus of about £700 at the end of 2020. Our main cost is payment of £8000 to covers our rector's stipend, expenses and Diocesan support. £2000 is needed for our annual insurance premium. In addition, there are general costs for electricity, maintenance and administration: these are variable but average about £1500 per annum. In addition to donations from our core congregation, others and tax relief, we received £1275 from our Illuminate and Celebrate Initiative and £700 from an Advent Appeal. As well as cash, parishioners give flowers, cleaning materials, refreshments and their valuable time all of which is much appreciated. £370 raised for charity was shared between Katharine House Hospice and The Children's Society with a small donation to Shutford News.

With an ageing PCC and congregation, there is a need for younger members of our community to support the volunteers we have and help share their work and financial commitment. Apart from some grant aid for restoration work, all other church running costs must be covered by village residents either directly or by supporting fund raising initiatives.

Travels with my memories by Debbie Pitt *Adapting to different cultures*

We are all very aware that when we go to other countries we should try hard to respect their culture and that although we might think it unusual or goes against what we might believe to be correct in our country, we are only visitors and should respect that as we would if we were visiting a friend's house and abide by their rules.

Having said that, sometimes it is difficult to get it right. Being a Muslim country, Bangladesh has many customs that I had to learn. For example, it's customary to only use your right hand when in public – your left hand is considered dirty. However, I am left handed. I learnt to adapt shortly after I tried paying a bicycle rickshaw driver and handed him over some notes which he refused to take. I was sure that he was not being generous in giving me a free ride and then realised that I had used my left hand to pay him. I put the money back in my purse and took out some other notes with my right hand which he accepted and promptly shoved down the front of his lungi (material worn like a skirt but usually with shorts under as well) and then produced some change from the same place. Not sure which was better but it seemed churlish to refuse the money!

Again in Bangladesh, everyone in the office stopped work to eat a cooked lunch together. During my 3 months there I was very careful to sit on my left hand and eat with my right (no knives or forks were used). At the end of my stay we had new volunteers one day and we were all sitting round eating lunch when one of the girls turned to me and whispered 'I am left handed as well and am so pleased you don't have to worry about eating with it' Oops, in my enthusiasm to greet new people I had completely forgotten to use only my right hand.

Afghanistan was an interesting country to work in for so many reasons. Even in Kabul all the women wore burkas and didn't shop in the general market, leaving that to their husbands. I was very amused to see crowds of men gathered around one stall, which was selling bras. Each man would have a good look at a few bras, take them to the shop owner, cup their hands to indicate the 'right size' and make their purchase. Not sure if the stall holder would have taken back the large size bought previously for a smaller one the next day.

Do you remember those swimming proficiency life-saving tests, where you had to wear pyjamas? I always thought it was odd, until I travelled to Vanuatu in the South Pacific. The country has a very conservative dress code for women – no upper arms or knees showing and loose fitting tops and certainly no trousers. There was an office outing



to the beach, and the beautiful blue sea was too tempting to me - but I had to swim fully dressed in a long skirt and baggy t-shirt. Wearing pyjamas is a lot easier! When I left, they very kindly gave me a leaving present of their traditional dress which a lot of women still wear. It is just like the pictures of Mother Hubbard with layers of materials and lace and puffy sleeves. I have to be honest: I have never worn it in this country.

One of the most difficult times in respecting other cultures and religions is during Ramadan (a lunar month of daily fasting, before the big celebration of Eid). The fasting is extreme, and no food or water consumed in daylight hours. People must refrain from 'bad habits' – smoking, gossiping and arguing are forbidden. Everyone insisted that they were fine with me having tea or water during the day as it was their decision to fast. But I still felt uncomfortable about drinking and eating in front of them. Even the smell of perfume was considered as breaking the fast as it is alcohol based so I stopped wearing any during this period. By the end of the day the Afghan drivers who drove me back home were extremely irritable: hungry, thirsty, and, being very heavy smokers, dying for a cigarette! I vividly



remember the sight and smell of the freshly baked Naan bread hanging up outside the shops waiting for the fast to break. Imagine how rewarding it feels to come together as a family or as a community and break your day's fast together – and how delicious the food must taste!



Theodore Fletcher's winning Bug Manor design has now been built and has been put in place on the Dairyground. There is a sign showing you where to find it.

It would be great if children could put bug friendly materials into the Bug Manor so that they can be encouraged to take up residence there.

Things that bugs like:

- Dead wood. Dead wood is an increasingly rare habitat and is essential for the larvae of wood-boring beetles. It also supports many fungi, which help to break down the woody material. Crevices under the bark hold centipedes and woodlice.
- Hollow stems. Hollow stems, such as old bamboo canes, or holes drilled into blocks of wood, make good nesting sites for solitary bees.
- **Stones and tiles.** Amphibians need a frost-free place to spend the winter. Stones and tiles give amphibians the cool, damp conditions they need.

- **Straw and hay**. These provide many opportunities for invertebrates to burrow in and find safe hibernation sites.
- **Dry Leaves.** Dry leaves offer homes for a variety of invertebrates by mimicking the litter on the forest floor.
- **Loose bark.** Beetles, centipedes, spiders and woodlice all lurk beneath decaying wood and bark.
- **Corrugated cardboard.** Roll up a piece of corrugated cardboard and put it in a waterproof cylinder to create a home for lacewings.
- **Dry sticks.** Dry sticks are perfect for ladybirds to hibernate in.

Insect attracting plants

The area near the new sign and the bench by the Bug Manor has been tidied up and improved with the addition of some insect attracting plants.

The planting was chosen as being beneficial for



insects and to look good by the bench. In summary:

- Lavender for butterflies and solitary bees
- Achillea (yarrow) for hoverflies, ladybirds, parasitic wasps and lacewings
- Nepeta (cat mint) for ladybirds, also bees, beneficial insects, butterflies/moths and other pollinators



- Thyme for bees and butterflies
- Alyssum for hoverflies, ladybirds and parasitic wasps
- Lobelia for parasitic wasps
- Mallow for hoverflies and parasitic wasps


