Visitors will be made very welcome at any of our forthcoming meetings, held in Shutford Village Hall on Tuesdays at 10am, when our future speakers will be:



Recipe from Holly Cringle

RHUBARB & CUSTARD CAKE

I love this cake as it is so versatile, I have served it as a dessert fresh from the oven with ice cream, as a cake with an afternoon tea. I have even used it before for a wedding cake.

- 2/3 stalks of rhubarb
- 250g soft margarine
- 3/4 tin of custard
- 250g self raising flour
- 250g caster sugar + 1 tablespoon for the rhubarb
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 8 inch cake tin

Take the rhubarb and cut into approx 5cms lengths, put it in a bowl with 1 tablespoon of caster sugar and coat the rhubarb. lay onto a baking sheet and roast at 200 degrees for 15 mins until just soft (this will depend on how thick your rhubarb is). Drain off any excess juice and leave to cool

Cream the margarine and sugar together, then add the eggs, vanilla extract and flour and mix.

Add the custard leaving approx. 6-8 tablespoons back.

Line a cake tin with parchment and spoon the mixture in.

Take the roasted rhubarb stalks and place them on the top, pushing slightly into the mix.

Take the remaining custard and "dollop" it in various places across the top of the cake.

Bake in the oven at 190 degrees for approx. 30 mins.

News from Thistle Hill...

Vegetable harvest on my allotment has been good this year with a bumper crop of potatoes and climbing French and runner beans. As ever the courgettes grow at a great pace and soon turn into

marrows if your back is turned for any length of time. Onions turned out well despite a scare early in the season.

Carrots and beetroot grew well but the local voles, or something with sharp teeth, has taken a liking to them chewing them at ground level making some unusable. Sweetcorn coming into season – so much sweeter than those from the supermarket.

Cabbage, purple sprouting, cauliflowers and broccoli were excellent in the spring but, despite being covered, are now being eaten alive by caterpillars – where are the birds when you need them?

Outdoor tomatoes suffering with blight and need to be destroyed. However, cucumbers are plentiful, despite the intermittent rainfall.

Sweet peas grew well, as have sunflowers – sunflowers, poppies, marigolds (calendula) and foxgloves pop up everywhere, with plenty of plants for next year. All encourage pollinators.

It is good to see everyone enjoying growing on the allotments and to share our surplus veg from time to time – especially courgettes and beans. It is a great pleasure to be able to share the fruits of our labours!

One small request, dog owners, please be aware of your companions' habits and pick up after they have done their business. Those who do not clean up and those who leave their plastic parcels – please think of others and treat the allotment field with respect: it is good that the farmer allows us to wander at will around the field, away from the designated footpath.

Let's hope we all have a successful harvest and continue to enjoy the Thistle Hill location and the company around us.

21/045/1 21/045/2	Holly Tree Felling on Thistle Hill - It was agreed that the Clerk would contact Kai O'Hanlan to see if he can cut down the Holly Trees on Monday as he will be working in Shutford on Monday 13th September.		
	Litter Pick – It was agreed that the Clerk would contact CDC to enquire if the litter picking equipment is available all the year round. It was agreed that the litter pick needs to be completed earlier in the year before the verges have grown up in 2022.		
21/046	Parish Matters:		
21/046/1	Allotments -		
	 Two beehives have been located on one of the allotment gardens. The shed that is used for water harvesting needs some attention. It was agreed that Cllr Helen Nixseaman would contact a resident to see if he could complete the repairs. 		
	3. It was agreed that the Clerk will report the Allotment Reserve in the accounts at every meeting.		
	4. Someone looking to rent an allotment on Thistle Hill to keep chickens has decided not to do this now.		
21/046/2	Shutford Goes Green – No volunteers have come forward yet to take on responsibility for this, but it was agreed that the parish council would consider the environment and sustainability in all decisions. Residents are requested to contact the Clerk or a councillor if they have any ideas to promote the environment and sustainability further.

	1. It was agreed that bulbs would be planted around the bench which Cllrs Helen Nixseaman and Stephen Barnes would purchase. Cllr Sandra Forrester has scattered some seeds around the area.		
	2. One of the benches is very rickety and it was agreed that this would be monitored and replaced next in the spring.		
	3. Cllr Ashley Taylor will tidy up the bench near the bug hotel.		

21/046/4	Queens Platinum Jubilee – Celebrations will take place from 2nd to 5th June 2022. Parishes are asked to light a beacon on 2nd June. It was confirmed that Shutford has a beacon that has been used for previous celebrations. Parishes are encouraged to hold a Big Jubilee Lunch on Sunday 5th June. It was suggested that the Shutford Get Together could be brought forward to 5th June.

The report suggested that the goal post could be fixed but it is believed that it has never fallen over and there is a benefit to it moving to reduce impact if someone runs into it. It also needs to be moved to facilitate mowing.

Dear friends,

O hushed October morning mild, Thy leaves have ripened to the fall; Tomorrow's wind, if it be wild, Should waste them all. The crows above the forest call; Tomorrow they may form and go. O hushed October morning mild, Begin the hours of this day slow.
Make the day seem to us less brief.
Hearts not averse to being beguiled,
Beguile us in the way you know.
Release one leaf at break of day;
At noon release another leaf;
One from our trees, one far away.

The above opening of Robert Frost's poem, simply titled 'October', captures the essence of the changing season that we are about to embark upon. October is a time of change, as we travel towards the 30th October when Summer time ends and we put back our clocks an hour. Gone will be the days of long summer evenings as the night draws in. It also is a time when I have to remember to get my torch out, especially after the evening services and events in church. I've also become ever more aware of the thousands of leaves on the Sycamore tree directly opposite me here at the Rectory, knowing full well that autumn will also bring with it for me, a sweeping brush and lots of days of leaf collecting.

It was another poet, Emily Dickinson, who reflected upon time in her famous poem 'Forever is composed of nows,' in which it's suggested she presents the idea that every small moment is happening now and collectively adds up to 'forever' or a lifetime. When we think about time it might seem so intangible, almost impossible to define and yet the journey of our life is being created out of the experiences that we have.

October and the beginning of November have been times, that across the generations, has been used to reflect and remember maybe not only those whom we continue to love but see no more, but also those who we remember on Remembrance Sunday on the 14th November.

As a Christian, when I think about the vastness of the concept of time, I'm always drawn to what is written in the second letter of Peter 3 v8 where it says;

But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day.

So as we journey in our lives through time and the changing season of Autumn, let us individually and together not only be aware of the moments of the here and 'now' but also how they are formed together to build our lifetimes together in our villages and communities.

The PCC has not met since the annual meeting in July with the next general meeting scheduled for 4th October. Because we could not have refreshments at the annual meeting, a social get together was arranged for 18th August when church members and others were able to meet our new rector, Rev Neil Bowler, informally over drinks and nibbles. Despite coronavirus restrictions, Rev Neil has been able to carry out pastoral care visits in the village and will get to know other villagers at social events, we hope to hold, in the autumn.

Weekly services have been held as planned and, with further relaxation of coronavirus restrictions, the wine chalice can be shared at communion. We can now sing in church and use music recorded on our electronic organ to accompany hymns. Masks in church are voluntary and we are sensitive to other people's space. The church is only open for services and private prayer on Sunday, however, church opening times will be reviewed in October.

Our core congregation continue to cover the cost of ministry and the half-yearly accounts show a surplus of £1800. We are grateful for all the support we receive either monetary or parishioner's valuable time spent on grass cutting, cleaning, flower arranging and admin. Special thanks to John for painting the church noticeboard, railings, gates and lamp post. In the absence of other fund raising, income from our Illuminate and Celebrate Initiative has again been used towards the cost of the church insurance this year.

Churchyard summer flowers have now faded, and the long grass will be cut and removed over the coming weeks. For the first time in many years, swallows did not return to their nests in the church porch this summer.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving was / is on 26th September with a Supper on 27th - money raised to be shared between the church and Katharine House Hospice.

OXFORDSHIRE HISTORIC CHURCHES STREET: Supporting Oxfordshire Churches since 1964

Over the years, OHCT has raised over £10 million of which £6 million has been used to maintain and support churches.

Locally, a grant of £7000 was awarded to SS Peter & Paul Swalcliffe for drainage works in 2020/21 and Horley church received £8000 for repairs and replacement of windows.

Income comes from members subscriptions, donations and legacies and other fund raising such as the annual Ride and Stride which takes place each September. This year St Martin's Church welcomed visitors with refreshments in the church porch and the George and Dragon provided toilet facilities. No one from Shutford took part, but Rev Canon Glyn Evans, who regularly leads worship in our benefice, will be raising funds for the trust and our local churches.

Travels with my memories by Debbie Pitt Transport

During my 15 years of travelling in exciting (and sometimes not so exciting) places, I have used a variety of transport modes. I have ridden side saddle on motor bikes through the traffic jams of Bangalore and push bikes taxi (very uncomfortable) in Uganda. Cycle rickshaws are very common in a lot of countries and you can get some very dodgy taxis where you can see the ground through the rusted car floor. But there is no doubt some of the most beautiful, interesting but hairy mode of transport have been by small planes.

One of the most memorable is flying in a seaplane in Bangladesh. Dhaka, the capital, is in a delta which spends a lot of the year virtually underwater. It is not until you are in the air can you see the true effect that water has on this country. I was visiting a floating hospital run by Sight Savers who visit remote rural villages using the water channels and volunteer doctors who give up their free time to perform, mostly, cataract operations. People would pour in from surrounding villages bringing in elderly relatives for the operation which only takes a few hours before they return back through the bush. As I flew down onto the water next to the hospital boat, the banks suddenly erupted with a throng of women in brightly coloured saris, children shyly hiding behind their mothers and elderly people being led by relatives. This charitable service offered to the blind or semi blind people allows many to return to providing a living for their families.

Not all flights were traditionally scenic. The rugged landscape of Afghanistan is quite amazing but I would not like to repeat the journey from Kabul to Jalalabad as when we were coming into land the pilot announced that the near vertical impeding descent, was necessary to avoid any rockets that the Taliban might send up – maybe if he had mentioned it at the start of the journey, I wouldn't have got on the plane. (I wrote this before the terrible recent takeover by the Taliban and my heart goes out to all those people who rejoiced when they left in 2002 and who now live in fear of their life and liberty. The majority of Afghans are peaceful, carefree people who just want to get on with their lives and as such, not unlike us.)



A 'jingle lorry', so called because of the chain curtains attached to the bumpers, are always so overloaded with goods but also provide entertainment for kids who hang onto the back for a ride as they drive slowly pass making their way across Afghanistan.

Local buses are a good way of seeing any country. When travelling with my daughter, we made many bus journeys. At one 'comfort break' we wondered why the other women on the bus went off into the fields. lifting their saris, squatting but still remaining discreet while we headed for some of the most revolting loos in the world. We learnt bladder control very quickly after that! On one bus journey in Nepal, the driver had his 10-year-old son sitting on his lap steering while the father was operating the pedals. I suppose I had to be grateful that

the child wasn't tall enough to reach the pedals as well! But seeing I was sitting next to an elderly man with a dreadful cough, which I was convinced was tuberculous, I thought I would meet my end one way or the other.

We all might complain at the state of our roads in Oxfordshire and the size of the potholes but in Nepal they are more proactive with some

great practical solutions. To warn people of the potential danger of the huge potholes, these are filled with very large branches but for just large potholes, I have seen some filled with a Yak jaw bone or even a Yak thigh bone – that is recycling taken to extremes.



The purpose of this plan is to ensure that all potential risks which could result in damage to property, injury to villagers or result in a denial of access to the village or inconvenience to residents have been considered and that all potential steps to reduce the risk or alleviate the impact have been investigated and suitable steps agreed. The plan includes contact details for all relevant personnel and organisations but should be amended/added to as appropriate.

However, at all times if you or anyone else is in immediate danger you should:

CALL 999 and follow all advice provided by the emergency services before considering the content of this guide.

WHY WE NEED A COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLAN

Whilst Shutford is a small rural village, which is fortunately considered low risk, emergencies do happen and whilst generally the impact will be limited in scope and severity it is important that we ensure that we have suitable communication channels and actions agreed to restrict the potential impact.

This document is intended to ensure that all necessary contact details and relevant actions are detailed in a single document which is available to everyone.

Whilst emergencies can make anyone vulnerable it is important that we recognise that some members of our community are more vulnerable than others and that our response always reflect this.




