We always like to welcome newcomers to our village, but recently we've had a lot of families who have moved, but not very far!


Here another of our non-movers share their story...




Shutford Book Club

Christmas Cupcakes - Recipe from Holly Cringle



Ingredients for the cupcakes

- 150g baking margarine 150g caster sugar
- 150g self raising flour 3 eggs
- 2 tablespoons of cocoa 3 tablespoons milk *Ingredients for decorations*
- 150g butter 300g icing sugar
- Green food colouring Cocoa powder
- Red smarties Curlywurly Icing eyes
- Coloured sprinkles Gold icing stars
- 1. Pre heat the oven to 180 degrees and place cupcake cases into cupcake tin.
- 2. Cream the margarine and sugar together.
- 3. Add the eggs one at a time and combine
- 4. Add the flour and cocoa powder and mix together
- 5. Slowly add the milk a tablespoon at a time and mix together.
- 6. Spoon into the cupcake cases and bake for 15 mins.

To decorate:

- 1. Mix the butter and icing sugar together to make a buttercream. For the Reindeer add 2x tablespoon of cocoa powder, for the Christmas trees add green food colouring.
- 2. Using a piping bag and a large nozzle, pipe a large tall swirl of icing on top of the cupcake.
- 3. For the reindeers: cut a Curlywurly into pieces to form "antlers" and place them in the top of the icing, then add a red smartie for the nose and some icing eyes (available in supermarkets)
- 4. For the Christmas trees: use coloured sprinkles for the "baubles" and a gold icing star for the top (available in supermarkets)

Table tennis pings back to Shutford!



In the summer of 2019, the village hall committee seized an opportunity given by Sports England to fund a table tennis facility for the benefit of the local community; under the scheme, they paid £200 for two tables and a significant amount of equipment. The club was later named the Shutford Pingers and membership rose to nearly twenty regular players; weekly sessions were thriving until the pandemic hit the UK and the rest of the world.

In August this year, the club relaunched Tuesday sessions which, unfortunately, were only attended by a relative few. This was understandable given people's fear of contracting Covid in public places although it should be noted that the village hall is well ventilated with hand sanitiser provided.

Later in September, Eric Barlow, a local licenced coach, dropped by and offered to help the club raise its game, and after an extremely productive meeting (in the George & Dragon of course), a series of taster sessions were planned.

Since that time, Eric and his trainee coach, Nick Walker, have spear-headed five tasters which have re-energised the whole team, attracted new members and provided fun-filled and entertaining evenings for all!

A typical session would start with a warm-up followed by coaching and practices for playing forehand & backhand drives, pushes and serves intermingled with games, such as 'Round the table knockout', that encompass newly acquired skills. These structured activities have cleverly been aimed at all levels of ability including beginners.

The evenings end with a drink (or two!) in the George and Dragon which provides the perfect atmosphere for the team to socialise with each other.

Looking towards the future, the current team have been trained to run the sessions by Eric and Nick in a structured and fun-loving way and there is also the possibility of a table-tennis partnership between Shutford and North Newington. Matches with other village clubs are on the radar!

Tuesday evenings (7.30-9pm) in the village hall are now just too good to miss, so come along and learn to play!

I have always been a runner completing 5-10ks and the odd half marathon, but never this sort of distance.

I drew up a training plan and started pounding the streets! As you all know, nothing is flat round here so training was slightly challenging. My longer routes took me to places such as

Wellesbourne, Cropredy, Chacombe.

Race day came around quickly, I stayed in London the night before to avoid travelling in the morning. I had set a personal goal of completing in under 4 hours. It was great weather conditions on the day and I was very happy to complete in 3 hours and 53 minutes! Huge thank you to everyone who sponsored and supported me. Sibford Gower School ran a mini marathon and I hope you all enjoyed the tuck shop!

On Sunday 3rd October I embarked on a huge personal challenge of running (ish) the London Marathon. I have entered the ballot for this race consistently for about 18 years and never got a place. This year I decided it was now or never and signed up for a charity place with Children with Cancer UK! The training had been good, running distances up to half marathon but as I extended beyond that, I damaged my knee and had a two month full running break just before the marathon. I



must say, this increased my feelings of terror massively!

On the day, as I exited the tube and walked round to the start line it was amazing to see the sheer number of people both preparing to race and also supporting. From the second I crossed the start line, the crowd support was immense. There was a plethora of music carrying you forward at every stage and so loud I could feel it vibrating through me. As the miles wore on, I found myself scanning the runners more and noticing all the different people putting themselves through this fun event/ordeal! There were people with physical disabilities, blind people running with a guide, a man on crutches who alternated running and hobbling, not to mention the rhinos, unicorns and other weird and wonderful costumes. Whilst running amongst these crazy and determined people, there was a real sense of joy because every single person was raising money for a charity and giving their all.

There was no 'wall' as such, just sore bits that you had to ignore! The crowd cheered from the very beginning until the very end. They cheered with everything they had and it really pushed me forward. Crossing the finish line was such a high and a feeling I will never forget. The day after the marathon I said 'Never again!', the day after that, I entered the ballot again for next year! It was physically gruelling and I suspect I have mentally blocked out sections but it's a challenge I would recommend to anyone! Fingers crossed for next year!

Thank you to all that sponsored me, the total raised was £3612.53 which is £4407.66 when gift aid is included.

Travels with my memories by Debbie Pitt Lasting impressions



As I wrote in my first account, I have been so incredibly privileged to have travelled to so many countries for my work and where I have met such amazing people.

This last account is summing up my lasting memories which I will always treasure.

One of these being when I assisted in a research project into the life of a nomad tribe in Pakistan. These nomads take their livestock up north to the summer pastures and then back south in the winter. Being nomadic, they weren't registered anywhere so had no health care or formal education for the children. They were desperate for more government support in these areas but they just failed to fit into the system. The child and maternal deaths where horrific with some mothers giving birth to 'blue babies' (one cause is interbreeding), underweight babies and difficult births all confined in their tents. Also as a result of the huge earthquake in 2005, many of their livestock were lost and consequently both income and food.

The nomads were also suspicious of foreigners as it seems that previous researchers had been asking similar questions but nothing had changed for them. I never knew what happened to our research but rather think that it was just discarded into someone's waste bin like many others.

On a brighter note, I have attended a few weddings in different countries. In Uganda they still have 'bride money' in the form of how many cows a daughter is worth. In Pakistan and India, the bride and groom have to sit motionless and expressionless on a platform while

everyone around them is eating and enjoying themselves. On the other hand, in Afghanistan the men will all dance and sing while the women are kept hidden although still manage to peak a look (none of this is probably allowed now, I'm sure). But all weddings seem to involve much the same as in this country – dressing up in fine clothes and eating lots and possibly drinking!

I am not a religious person but I couldn't help but be moved when I was in Ethiopia. There is an amazing place called Lalibela known for its churches which are hewn into the rocks below revealing just the very top of them. I watched one early Easter Sunday morning as worshippers walked over the large smooth rocks holding their staffs and wearing long white robes. It was a truly Biblical scene.

Of course, not all sights were moving or beautiful. In Bangladesh there is a muddy 'beach' where old ships are floated up on at high tide and then manually broken up. These workers are not wearing any protective clothing and sometimes no shoes although they work with heavy machinery.

I had to smile when I saw women in India digging a trench for what I assumed to be for cabling. I expect the contract was with the EU or similar which stipulated that hard hats must be worn. So these women were, indeed wearing hard hats, but also no shoes and flowing saris which would have caused more health and safety risks than could have warranted a hard hat!

I hope that my accounts of my travels might inspire anyone else to travel – I have been so incredibly honoured to have done so and as great as Shutford is, there are also so many other places in the

world worth visiting. And it is never too late – I only really started in my midfifties!

The annual Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust Ride and Stride took place on 11th September. Although there were no participants from Shutford, Rev Canon Glyn Evans walked around the benefice and some of the funds he raised will help our local churches. Glyn was one of the only 3 people who visited St Martin's Church this year. As the church was not open, refreshments were provided in the church porch with toilet facilities available at the George and Dragon. (KJJ apologises for his typing error in the OHCT article on page 21 of Shutford News Sept/Oct 2021 edition: Street should have read Trust!)

A church team served tea and cake at the Village Get Together in the manor field which was a social success. We are grateful to the organisers of the event and to Shutford Village Hall Committee and other sponsors who covered the costs of it. St Martin's Church has received a donation of £600 which will be used towards the church annual insurance bill of about £2000.

Benefice churchwardens were enrolled, for the coming year, at a service in Deddington Church on 21st September. The Bishop of Dorchester, Rt Rev Gavin Collins and The Archdeacon, The Ven Judy French officiated.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving was held on 26th September. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers, fruit and vegetables donated by villagers. The usual harvest hymns were sung but the small congregation was outnumbered by those in the pub garden enjoying a late summer drink. Perhaps we should have the courage to hold our Harvest Thanksgiving outside the church in future – at least one of our benefice villages has done this?

A Harvest Supper and Sale was held in Shutford Village Hall on 27th September – it was a good evening with great company and food raising $\pounds 420$. $\pounds 250$ has been given to Katharine House Hospice. Thanks to everyone who supported the event with donations of food, produce, raffle prizes and cash.

The PCC met on 4th October: church services rotas for the remainder of 2021 and the start of 2022 had been circulated. Average attendance in church for all styles of worship is stable but not growing. The monthly Benefice

Service time changes to 11.00am from January and non-communion services restyled as All Age Family Services – few younger people with children attend church so non church based interactive worship is being considered. As with many organisations, the church needs new members to join as at present there are no obvious successors to take on lead roles in the church to ensure its future. We have two vacancies on the PCC, including a second churchwarden.

Compared to 2020, the church is in a good financial position with regular donations from worshippers and others covering all costs. A donation of £2000 has also been received for any restoration work needed – this includes the installation of safety railings at the top of the church steps behind the George and Dragon, repairs to stone by the porch gates and replacement of plaster in the church ceiling. A meeting with our Archdeacon and a representative of the Diocesan Advisory Committee was held in September to discuss this work and the creation of a new area in the churchyard, to the north of the church, for the interment of ashes. A faculty (church name for planning permission) will be needed, and full details of any proposals will be published for all to see: this work should be done by summer 2022.

St Martin's Church is now usually open daily for private prayer from 10.30am until 4.30pm. Although there are hygiene measures in place, any visitors must take personal responsibility for their own health and safety. Everyone is welcome to visit the church and churchyard for some quiet time.

November is a special time for remembrance – All Saints and All Souls Days – 1st and 2nd, Armistice Day – 11th and Remembrance Sunday – 14th. The church tower has been illuminated for these and on other days to remember those we continue to love but see no more. Shutford has lost several members of the community in recent weeks – Tony, Anthony, Obby, Bob and Viv whom we remember: we offer our sympathy to their friends and families.

Deddington Brass played for the hymns on Remembrance Sunday and before and after the service. The retiring collection has been given to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal together with other money collected in Shutford.


