

We gave our January book, 'Still Life' by Sarah Winman, a majority 5 Star rating.



News from Thistle Hill...

Winter is nearly over: the spring equinox was on 20th March so with increasing daylight and better growing conditions our crops should thrive.

For the first time in many years, if ever, sheep grazed on the farmers land next to the allotments for several weeks enjoying their fill of a crop of turnips. They have now gone to new pastures and the field has been ploughed and a new crop planted. At least the farmer will have been able to reduce his input of phosphates thanks to the sheep's organic deposits.

As mentioned by Jef in the last News, wildlife abounds with pigeons and pheasants enjoying some late greens, and mice or rats or voles eating parsnips. Moles continue to burrow across many of the allotments so there must be an abundance of worms. I don't know if the muntjac deer does any damage?

Most of my allotment has been dug with a few purple sprouting plants left. Others have some Brussels, other greens and parsnips still to harvest. There are also a few leeks which have survived the winter, despite early setbacks.

Those who have greenhouses on the allotments have new vegetable seeds germinating and early potatoes chitting. Some have over wintering broad beans but mine are germinating in pots in my greenhouse at home where they are safer from the hungry mice and rats on Thistle Hill.

I've bought my vegetable and flower seeds for this year, along with onion sets and seed potatoes. We have just finished eating last year's onions and have plenty of potatoes remaining from last summer's crop. We also have runner and french beans and raspberries and gooseberries in our freezer.

I notice my rhubarb is shooting back which may be large enough to harvest in a few weeks. The raspberry canes are also showing signs of new growth.

As the soil warms, sowing and planting outdoors can start – broad beans, peas and onion sets with early potatoes at the end of March. We are inclined to take risks and plant outside hoping for an early crop, however it is wiser to be patient as many of us have been caught out by poor seed germination and late frosts. However, our water butts are full ready for spring irrigation if needed.

March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers...... and some good vegetable crops we hope.

From the Archives...





THE HISTORY OF THE VILLAGE HALL, 1998

As you will see from the adjacent plaque on the wall here, this Village Hall was built by the Shutford Social Club and opened by Mrs M. J. Bauer, who lived in Shutford Manor, on 21st June 1954, in a ceremony attended by Lord Saye and Sele and other dignitaries.

Before the present Hall was erected, larger functions were held in one of the outbuildings of Shutford Manor. Smaller functions were held in the Foresters Hall, the former blacksmiths shop or the small brick building, known as the Social Club room. This was formerly a Primitive Methodist Chapel. It was then owned by the Shutford Social Club, who were later responsible for providing this Village Hall.

It was a slow process raising the money for this in the hard times before the second World War, and then fund raising was interrupted by the outbreak of war.

One of the mainstays of the fund raising was Walter Padbury, who with his record player and set of drums, provided music for dances and other functions and who was secretary to several village committees.

Shutford was originally two villages, Shutford East and Shutford West. Most of Shutford East was part of the Broughton Castle Estate. On Banbury Hill, where the Village Hall is now, were the derelict remains of a cottage where a Mrs White once sold ginger pop. Along the plot and adjacent to the pub was a path which led up to the churchyard. The stone stile is still there but the path is overgrown. This site was donated by formal agreement by the then Lord Saye and Sele in 1952 as a site for a Village Hall building. At that stage there was still a shortfall in building funds. To make this up the Social Club room was sold by tender which raised the princely sum of £125.

Temporary and hazardous steps with a handrail were put in, temporary being a flexible word as the steps and handrail were finally replaced in 1998!

Under guidance of ORCC, a Village Constitution was drawn up. This included a list of village organisations to be represented in the Village Hall Committee, plus 3 village representatives elected at each AGM.

Having erected the hall there was no money left for maintenance work. Over the years, however, and thanks to energetic fund raising and grants, it has been possible to maintain and extend fund raising and grants, it has been possible to maintain and extend the building by adding a kitchen and storeroom and to carry out various works of decoration, improvement and equipment.

Coming up the steps you will have noticed the Shutford War Memorial and you may have wondered why it is not closer to the Church. Because of the strong and deep running feeling withing the village, the war memorial, unveiled in its original form in 1957 was placed outside the village hall - a site acceptable to all villagers.

UPDATE FROM THAMES WATER

Following up from a query several months ago about discharges into the Shutford Stream and maintenance on the sewage plant, we received this update on planned work from Thames Water.

SEWAGE DISCHARGE

The request for figures for the discharge into the Shutford Stream over the last 6 months shows that discharges have happened 244 times for just under 743 hours in the 6 month period prior to 10 July 2021.

We're working hard to make these discharges unnecessary with the help of the government, Ofwat and the Environment Agency as even when legally permitted, discharges into rivers are simply unacceptable. By working with local partners, we're actively listening to our customers and we want to do the right thing for rivers and the local communities who love and value them.

SHUTFORD SITE

The Shutford Sewage Treatment Works has been identified as a site which is not always able to meet the permitted flow to full treatment (FtFT) level and other conditions set out in its environmental permit.

A major capital scheme is currently being undertaken to resolve the current flow compliance risk. This scheme is being delivered in conjunction with a project to reduce the levels of Phosphorous being discharged within the final effluent. The following gives details of both upgrades and timescales for delivery.

Flw Compliance

- Provision of a new elevated inlet balance tank (Balance tank to include. FtFT flow control to the distribution Chamber, Storm overflow to the existing chamber and a new FtFT flowmeter) to enable FtFT /storm spill flow control.
- Upsized pipework from the distribution chamber to percolating filters

- · 2 New distribution arms to each of the existing percolating filters
- · A new humus settlement tank

Low phosphorous scheme

- · Provision of a Ferric sulphate dosing package plant
- · A Sodium hydroxide dosing package plant
- · A Tertiary Treatment plant, including a new backwash & liquor return combined balance tank and pumping station to return flow to the existing distribution chamber downstream of the storm water flow split.
- · New primary settlement tank
- · New Sludge Holding/Consolidation tank

The forecasted date of beneficial use from these upgrades is currently expected to be June 2024.

In addition to these schemes, we are installing spill to storm tank monitors to provide definitive data regarding when flow goes into the storm tanks. This is due to be installed by the end of March 2022.



Church services have been held as planned each Sunday, with the benefice occasion moving to a 11.00am start. However, this will change again to a 10.30am start during British Summer Time. Our core congregation continue to worship regularly, but we have had no families with children in church this year so far, even for our All Age Family Worship. Because of this, in addition to Family Worship in church, we intend to hold 4 Messy Church Events in Shutford Village Hall – these could be held more often if help was available to organise them. The first Messy Church is on Good Friday (15th April) between 10.00am and 12noon. There will be crafts, the Easter Story and refreshments to finish. The other events will be on Saturdays: 25th June, 24th September and 10th December between 3.00pm and 5.00pm. These occasions are free, informal, great fun and are ideal for young families.

The PCC met on 9th February at which the annual report and accounts were accepted. The present financial situation is sound with regular worshippers covering our main costs, with others making donations and supporting fund raising initiatives. In addition to our usual income, we received a legacy of £2000 which will be used for restoration work, including the installation of safety railings in the churchyard and repairs to plaster work in church. Copies of the accounts are held in church and will be published on the village website in due course. Although the church can reclaim tax on gift aided income and is eligible for VAT relief on some building projects, all other costs must be covered by villagers. Based on 2021 figures, £220 per week is needed to keep the church open, which equates to about £60 per annum from each village household but excludes donations to charity and building restoration work.

During Lent, which started on Ash Wednesday, 2nd March, various talks and discussions will take place across the benefice. The meeting in Shutford on 23rd March was entitled "What's Prayer got to do with it? - based on books written by Rowan Williams and Sister Wendy Beckett.

Also, Oxford Diocese is exploring the Lord's Prayer with daily bible readings and reflections. Our own congregation is undertaking a 40 day

challenge studying a Live Lent Embracing Justice Booklet. There have also been weekly Lent Lunches, with the one in Shutford on 11th April in Shutford Village Hall from 12.30 – 2.00pm. Good company and food guaranteed with soup, bread and cheese and hot crossed buns – donations to Katharine House Hospice.

The church annual meeting date is 4th April at which churchwardens and church council members will be elected for the coming year. With a core congregation of about 25, of whom only half wish, or are eligible to serve on the PCC, it is becoming more difficult to cover key roles. Parish life is challenging and with an ageing congregation, there is a need for younger members of our community to help, to keep the church viable and part of village life. Mission and outreach are top priorities with an emphasis on families with children, but not forgetting our existing congregation and our community pastoral care. The church building is a village asset for all to use.

For the first time in three years, we have three weddings and two baptisms planned for the spring. We look forward to welcoming the happy couples and the two young children and their families to church for these special services.

On a sad note, we offer our sympathy to the family and friends of Jennifer Aldous whose funeral was held in St Martin's Church on 23rd February. Jennifer lived for many years at Fiveways Cottage and has been laid to rest with her husband Dr Michael Aldous who died 5 years ago.

The Deddington Deanery Synod had an online meeting on 8th February and discussed the work of the church in this area and how it can engage with all generations. The deanery has a resident population of about 66,000 and covers everything from affluent villages to areas of deprivation, both rural and urban.

The Bishop of Oxford visited the Deanery on 16th February – he held meetings during the day in Cropredy, St Mary's School, Banbury, Wykeham Park Farm and Deddington, culminating in a Questions and Answers session in St Mary's Church, Banbury in the evening. In the last six months or so, Bishop Steven has visited all 29 Deaneries in the Oxford Diocese, which covers Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire, and has 812 churches in 626 parishes.

With the arrival of spring, we have primroses, celandines and daffodils in flower in the churchyard. Spend some time quietly there, or in church: everyone is always welcome.


