ARTY CRAFTY NEWS - POPPIES REQUIRED

Have you noticed yarn bombing around our village? If you knit or crochet could you make a few poppies? It would be great to create a display for our War Memorial for Remembrance Day. I have included a Royal British Legion pattern but there are many more online and all shapes and sizes would be welcome. Feel free to join us at our Arty Crafty meetings too.



Knitted Poppy Patterns

For the best finish, knit with a Double Knit (DK Yarn). The size of needle you use will determine how big the poppy will be, but we recommend 3.5mm or 3.75mm (UK9). If you have different yarn available just use that and the appropriate needle size.

EASY GARTER/KNIT STITCH PATTERN

Colour A - Red (one ball will make a lot of poppies)

Colour B - Black - (either scrap of wool or Black button)

Body of Poppy.

Using Colour A: Cast on 120 stitches

- Rows 1-4: Knit
- Row 5: Knit 3 stitches together across the row (40 stitches)
- Rows 6-9: Knit

- Row 10: Knit 2 stitches together across the row (20 stitches)
- Rows 11-14: Knit
- Row 15: Knit 2 stitches together across the row (10 stitches)
- Cut yarn leaving a tail of about 20cm.

Thread tail through yarn needle and slip all the remaining live stitches onto the yarn tail and pull tight. Pull around into a circle and then mattress stitch (or use whatever stitching you normally use) to seam for an invisible seam. Sew in ends.

Centre of Poppy.

Using Colour B: Cast on 16 stitches. Cast Off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre, or use a black button with 4 holes and sew to the centre of Poppy.

The Shutford Book Review

NO ONE IS TALKING ABOUT THIS BY PATRICIA LOCKWOOD

The book was shortlisted for the Booker Prize and the Women's Prize for Fiction in 2021. It's fair to say that the majority of book club members - with a couple of exceptions - were not enamoured! It's certainly a highly original book which touches on very current and at times acutely sensitive issues, and splits into two very distinct sections. The first describes the life of a woman entirely engrossed in

an online world to the extent that she experiences panic when being away from her phone for a matter of minutes. But her obsession with Twitter and scrolling is seriously challenged when her sister is faced with a life changing decision surrounding her unborn child, bringing issues such as abortion rights in the US, the power of family ties and the powerful lasting legacy any life can have on others, however short and challenging it might be. Certainly not an easy read, and some members didn't attempt the second half feeling utterly bewildered by the first! But others said it would stay with them for a long time even if they found it a challenging read. The 2.5/5 score reflects the fact that we ranked it as a 'Marmite' book - some would give it zero, others a five!

THE GLASS ROOM BY SIMON MAWER

This book was enjoyed by the majority of book club members with some reading it for the second time. It was rated 4.5 out of 5.

Set mainly in Czechoslovakia in the late 1920s the story spans seven decades. But it is more than an historical novel; it's a novel that explores the nature of love, betrayal and secrets. It particularly resonates with the Russian invasion of Ukraine today.

Viktor and Liesl want to build a house that embodies the future and abandons the past. Liesl lost a brother in the First World War and they both experienced the



break up of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. The main feature of this house is the "Glass Room which is supposed to be a sanctuary of calm. But over the years and through World War 2 and then the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia so much goes on in the Glass Room that it is anything but calm. The Glass Room goes through various incarnations over the years; it is a laboratory, a gymnasium, part of a hospital in which the lives of the different protagonists are played out. Simon Mawer is a clever writer and his style of writing draws you into the story making it a compelling page turner even with those heart-stopping moments.

The company was very convivial. Chatting and laughing throughout the evening. Drinks were "Bring your Own" so no complaints there.

There were five curries to taste, consisting of beef, lamb, chicken, prawn, vegetable dhal rice and flat breads all served on a lovely recyclable multi bowl Thali tray. The vegetarian option was a paneer with mushroom, tandoori butternut squash pepper and tomato curry.

At this point people were all filling up and dessert was to follow.

Fortunately the Indian dessert bites were a mouthful each but none the less scrummy.

After paying all our expenses we had £52 left. This will be paid into Keron's charity of choice.

News from Thistle Hill...

Its fast-approaching factory fortnight and all the allotments are looking really good, tidy and well cared for with plenty of produce growing away.

First early potatoes are ready to lift, and our peas, beans, carrots, early cauliflowers and broccoli have already been harvested and eaten! French and runner beans are climbing upwards, and the pumpkins, squash and courgettes are scrambling across the ground. The sweetcorn is planted in blocks to maximise fertilisation. Leeks and brassicas are either already in the ground or waiting to go in.

The weather has been pretty good in the last two months, a nice mix of sun and rain and warmish nights; much better conditions than last year. As I write, we are facing apocalyptic sunshine which you will give your right arm for next week, when on holiday, dressed in anoraks and entertaining bored kids.

All the plots are taken now, with one new plot holder taking on the last remaining plot in July. This has already been knocked into shape ready for next year.

Although the planting season is coming to a close, there are still things you can plant for a late crop. Try oriental greens such as pak choi, cabbage, mustards, etc, and a late harvest of French beans, lettuce, radish, beetroot, carrots, spinach and chard.

Watering is a problem as the soil is pretty stony and sharply

drained. The answer is plenty of organic matter each year, but in the short term the majority of crops that are well established can survive, so save your watering for newly planted veg. August will bring plenty of rain so if you can, leave planting till it rains.

Pests are also taking full advantage of your hard work, so keep your crops covered up from butterflies, carrot flies and leek moths which will all be making an appearance soon. Keep on top of the weeding - hoeing works well, but if it's getting out of hand, wade in with a spade and scythe them off at ground level. I have even mowed them to stop them flowering and setting seed.

Looking forward to see what everyone has grown this year, such as unusual crops, the successes as well as failures. They'll be a produce show in the autumn, so check out the village email for updates.

A shaded lamp and a waving blind,
And the beat of a clock from a distant floor:

Dear friends,

These two beautiful verses from Thomas Hardy's poem, An August Midnight, describes the poet sat at his desk as he welcomes visitors; a longlegs, a moth, a Dumbledore (an old English term for a bumblebee) and finally a fly. Each of these visitors are personified as they gather around the light of the lamp with the poet.

It's suggested that the main theme of Hardy's poem is a reflection upon the meaning and purpose of life, in relationship with the natural world around him. Why does this meeting happen, why do the insects gather together at this very moment around the light?

On one level the poem might be thought of as just being a nice poem about a man sitting at a desk with his lamp on, which in turn is attracting various insects, (we only have to have a light on in our houses at night during the summer and a window open, to know what happens next). But of course for Hardy there is much more happening, because it's suggested that he uses this simple imagery to begin to question about the meaning and purpose of his own life in relationship to whether he believes there is a God.

As a Christian the verse of the Bible where Jesus says 'I am the light of the

world' comes to mind as I read the poem, those who see and hear of the wonderful attraction of the light in their lives, are drawn towards it, whilst there are others who look on and wonder why?

We continue to collect non-perishable food for Banbury Young Homeless Project and are thankful to those who make donations. There is a box at the back of the church with a note of items welcomed by them.

Christian Aid Week was 15th to 21st May. Collection envelopes were delivered to most households in the village and an e-envelope set up to receive donations. A total of £355 (plus gift aid of £86) was collected but it was disappointing only a few villagers responded to this important appeal. Perhaps we are suffering from charity appeals fatigue with so many needing money?

A Benefice Service to celebrate Pentecost (Whit Sunday) and the Queens Jubilee was held in St Martin's Church on 5th June at 10.30am. Members of the benefice choir led the singing of the hymns with Ruth playing the organ. Refreshments were enjoyed in the church after the service.

Father's Day, 19th June, was celebrated with a lay led All Age Family Service. Dads present were given some goodies to take home but like Mothering Sunday in March, there were no children in church. Absence of families with children in church is an ongoing concern with many other activities on a Sunday taking priority. To try to encourage involvement, our Messy Church Events will continue with one on 24th September at 3.00pm in Shutford Village Hall. This will have a harvest theme to co-inside with our Harvest Festival in church on 25th September at 6.00pm and Harvest Supper and Sale in Shutford Village Hall on 26th September at 7.30pm. Money raised at the supper will be given to a local charity.

Despite a wet day, the Shutford Festival was a social and financial success and a church team, led by Sue, was pleased to serve tea and cake during the afternoon. Special thanks to our lady bakers who made and donated the cakes. The teas raised £447, an excellent result. Thanks also to the festival organisers and sponsors for their hard work and generosity. £800, from the festival, given to St Martin's Church, will be used towards the church annual insurance.

All local churchwardens were enrolled at a service in Adderbury church on 28th June. This service was led by the Associate Archdeacon of Dorchester, Revd Canon David Tyler who thanked churchwardens and others for their work in local churches over the past year. He also encouraged everyone to continue to keep churches flourishing at the heart of our various communities.

A PCC and Benefice meeting have been held on successive days: items on the agendas included Worship, Mission and Outreach, Finance, Wykeham News, Eco Church and lay ministry.

Church attendance in Shutford is stable and we have been pleased to welcome an additional 500 to church through weddings, baptisms, and thanksgiving services. We are presently financially stable thanks to our regular worshippers, fund raising and additional money from collections.

The Wykeham Benefice News is delivered to every household in our benefice (about 1400 copies) free of charge. Although the information in the WBN is available on our website, it is important that a paper copy is delivered, especially to those who do not have or wish to use electronic communication systems. The Benefice will continue to update the website on a regular basis and in due course will introduce other means of electronic communication, for those who prefer to use it. The Deanery is setting up a Facebook page.

Eco Church: as a church we are presently measuring our environmental footprint with an aim of reducing our carbon usage. Small steps can lead to change, so we have undertaken a survey which covered worship and teaching, buildings, our churchyard, community engagement and lifestyle. Turning off lights, use of LED bulbs and non-use of oasis for flower arranging and the wilding of our churchyard have helped. We use green energy.

Our All Age Worship Services are lay led with further involvement planned for communion services. We have appointed Jocelyn Merris as a lay minister, initially based in Swalcliffe, which will enable us to continue to offer a service in each of our churches most Sundays. Lay people also help at Messy Church.

The annual Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust Ride & Stride Event takes place 10th September. Details on how to take part, raising funds for our local churches, can be found on the OHCT website or from Ken Jeffs.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

Firstly, I must thank all our hirers and users of the Village Hall for restoring our activity levels to those we enjoyed before the Covid-19 pandemic. Also, I must thank our Committee and volunteers who made this possible. During the course of the year a few of our volunteers withdrew and their contributions will be greatly missed.

Users and visitors have continued to praise the Hall, now in its 5th year since rebuild, for its quality and the facilities it provides. Thanks must also go to Cherwell District Council for their financial support during the Covid restrictions, which had such a significant effect on so many social activities, not just in our small village, but throughout the world.

Our cleaners have continued to keep the Hall in good order and the frequency of cleaning reduced only during the first three months of this period when Covid restrictions were still in place. Monthly Sunday breakfasts have now restarted and continue to be popular, as are the WI, Pilates, Yoga, Table Tennis and Art activities. We are still seeking someone to run the film club during the autumn and winter months. The flight of steps joining the Hall to St Martin's Church have been made and installation is expected during the next reporting period.

Fortunately, and because we pursued all the help offered, our financial position continued to be strong and therefore we extended the offer of half price hire charges for villagers to the end of March 2023.




