

Shutford TTC Junior Coaching Development:

Overview by Eric Barlow, the Coach
Junior coaching will resume Tuesday 20th September
at the usual time 6 - 7.30 in the village hall.

Prior to any Shutford activities, on behalf of the Banbury League I'd been working as Coaching and Development Officer helping to develop an integrated league, club and schools coaching structure. Had also personal involvement at North Newington as club coach – the club was highly successful but like many other TT activities, stopped for 2 years because of lockdown and didn't recover from the pandemic and folded. Then 'the Shutford Project' came along.......

Shutford TTC: Table tennis had been identified as an activity that all villagers could easily enjoy using its new village hall facility and TT equipment. There had been some limited TT activity but not until last August that did the club really begin to develop. Initially starting with less than a handful of players the adults section is now ~18 members and typically 10-12 players attend on a Tuesday club nights, mainly due from the enthusiasm and organisation of the adult TT team plus support from the village hall committee. The 'adults learn to play' has been hugely successful and from a coach perspective was very enjoyable. Going to the pub after TT has always been an important aspect of this club. Back in April/May our players took part in the Banbury League friendly team competitions and we've now got a team playing in the Banbury League, starting in September.

Juniors: Having already established the adult section we were now also keen to create a junior club including coaching – an important characteristic of any progressive sports club. We arranged (probably after some discussions over a pint) to carry out TT taster sessions in nearby primary schools including Sibford and Bishop Carpenter. The response from Sibford School involving kids from Shutford and other nearby villages was excellent. The junior section was formed in March with emphasis on getting active, having fun and playing some games at the same time but learning some new TT skills. Player progress has been very good

and I and the other helpers have enjoyed it too. We now have 14 juniors involved with our club with some players just attending the adult section. In the Banbury area only the Bodicote club have an equivalent junior membership. We want to continue with the original aims but if junior players progress sufficiently then we also have the capability to move to next level. There are various pathways that can be followed (but not quite yet) to achieve this.

TTE Young Ambassador: Nicholas Walker, who for many years has been involved with my TT junior coaching groups, has also joined the club. As a Table Tennis England Young Ambassador he's also been helping out with Shutford juniors coaching (and adults) and recently completed 60 hours of voluntary service. He's now studying for his UKCC level 1 qualification to become a licensed coach which should give him some further skills to help develop our Shutford juniors. It's a very good example how involvement with TT can help shape a young person's life. Well done Nicholas.

Safeguarding children: Banbury Table Tennis and including Shutford TTC take safeguarding young people very seriously. Licensed coaches are trained for Safeguarding matters and insured by Table Tennis England for accidents/liability etc. For safeguarding purposes we are required to have 2 adults present at junior club coaching sessions. We often get good support from our adult players but occasionally we'll also need support from parents – why not get involved! To help out the junior section one of our club players Andrew McEwen is also considering to become a licensed coach.

Shutford TTC club shirts: I'm keen that clubs should try to establish a strong identity and members to develop a sense of belonging to a proper sports club. Andrew is organising proper TT club shirts for our members including juniors – further info to follow. An additional cost yes (but coaching here is currently free) but I'd like to encourage this. Hopefully we can negotiate some cheaper options for smaller sizes. **Would anyone consider shirt sponsorship?**

TT Racquets: I'd strongly recommend that parents consult me before purchasing a bat for their youngsters. It's important that new bats have the optimum characteristics (spin, speed, control) for the ability that individual player. Have a word with me and I can get these at cost price.

Adult sessions have continued more or less through the summer but we're now looking forward to restarting our junior section in September, after the resumption of the school term. The club has made tremendous progress in only a year. We're hoping that our existing players (including those who elected to do their summer sports) continue to enjoy table tennis at Shutford. Table tennis is a sport for all abilities and we can accommodate both 'just for fun' and competitive players in our club. Let's keep active and enjoy TT participation with friends!

News from Thistle Hill...

When I wrote in March, we had just passed the spring equinox and I had purchased vegetable and flowers seeds, onion sets and seed potatoes for the growing months ahead. Six months on, with the

nights drawing in and the autumn equinox on 23rd September, we can be thankful for the excellent summer we have had and as a result the good crops we have harvested.

I keep a record of what I plant and try to undertake some crop rotation but with a relatively small area to cultivate this is not always possible.

My beans were all started off in pots at home in my unheated greenhouse, as I did with tomatoes, cucumbers, courgettes, lettuce and brassicas. This I find ensures better germination and protection from the mixed weather in the spring and mice and voles looking for an easy meal.


I grew Cobra climbing french beans and Safari dwarf ones, the runner beans were a mixture of Polestar and White Lady, the seeds of which I had collected last autumn. The climbing french bean crop was excellent but the dwarf variety less so due to the drought. The runner beans were slow to start producing but with recent rain there has been a second flush with a good crop.

My potatoes are good: Charlotte salad potatoes and Cara and Maris Piper main crop were grown. I have harvested sufficient potatoes to last until next year, the Cara crop did particularly well with some baking size potatoes produced.

Cabbages have suffered with the drought and butterflies and their caterpillars have devastated some of the plants. Carrots and beetroot have been good and have not been eaten by voles so much this year. My Tasty Green cucumbers and Defender courgettes have produced endless fruit, despite lack of rain mid-summer: courgettes can turn into marrows as soon as your back is turned! A mixture of Sungold, Sweet Million and Money Maker tomatoes continue to crop and have avoided blight this year. Lettuce, radish, salad onions, peas and onion sets have also done well. Parsnips and swedes should be ready soon.

Away from my plot, there is an abundance of fruit in the hedgerows: blackberries, hips, haws, crab apples, sloes and elderberries. What is less welcome however, is bags of dog poo – dog owners please observe the country code and respect our environment. Thistle Hill is a great place to garden, to greet our fellow gardeners and others taking a daily stroll. Even better, with a surplus of produce, we can share it with fellow villagers and celebrate our good fortune and bountiful harvest. Long may it continue.



Mattie has a thrilling past and an annoyingly uneventful present. During the Women's Suffrage Campaign she was a militant, jailed five times, she marched,




Now, in middle age she is looking for another challenge. Giving the wooden club a twirl she is struck by an idea.....

It was with great sadness we heard of the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II. She was at the heart of life in our United Kingdom and the commonwealth during a happy and glorious reign of more than 70 years. On her 21st birthday in 1947, she declared that her whole life would be devoted to the service of our country and empire, which it was. During her reign, and marriage of 73 years, she was supported by her husband and consort Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. Reunited with Prince Philip, may she rest in peace. King Charles III has succeeded his mother: may his reign be happy and glorious too.

Various special services have been held and prayers said for Queen Elizabeth. A Wykeham Benefice Book of Condolence was opened in Sibford Church and a Shutford Village one in St Martin's Church for everyone to record their thoughts and reflections. There are flowers in church, the church bell has been tolled in her memory and the tower illuminated during the period of mourning. On the eve of her funeral, a Wykeham Benefice Solemn Memorial Evensong was held in St Peter & St Paul's church in Swalcliffe at 6.00pm.

The annual Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust Ride & Stride Event took place on 10th September. There were 17 visitors to St Martin's Church where refreshments were available. Special thanks to Richard at the George and Dragon for allowing visitors to use the pubs facilities. There were no participants from Shutford raising funds this year, but anyone can donate to the Churches Trust if they wish, at www.ohct.org.uk.

This year's Harvest Thanksgiving was the last weekend of September with Fun Family Church in Shutford Village Hall on Saturday, 24th September, the Family Harvest Festival on Sunday and a Harvest Supper on Monday, 26th September. As usual, the church was decorated with flowers, fruit and vegetables donated by villagers. Funds raised from the harvest sale and donations for the supper food and a raffle will be given to a local charity.

Full report will be printed in the next Shutford News.

Our church is open every day for private prayer, on Saturday for Morning Prayer and on Sunday for Holy Communion or All Age Family Worship. We have a monthly Benefice service at one of our churches and there is midweek and Sunday online worship. A few families with children do support our Quarterly Craft afternoons but are there any villagers with pre-school children who would value a more frequent get together midweek in Shutford Village Hall with craft activities and refreshments? We will be looking at our mission and outreach plans to grow our congregation as we need younger people to help existing older members to keep the church open and part of village life.

Thanks to the support of our core worshipping congregation and others, we are financially stable with sufficient money to cover all our costs and restoration work needed this year. We have received quotes to install some safety fencing behind the pub and await guidance from the Oxford Diocese as to what would be most suitable. We also await quotes for some plaster work, lime washing and the cost of a 5 yearly inspection of the electrics.

With drought conditions during the summer, the wildflowers and grasses in the churchyard faded earlier than usual, so the long grass has been cut down. We have plans to plant some yellow rattle seed to reduce the dominance of some of the grasses helping smaller flowers to thrive. Native hedging will be planted in parts of the church to encourage wildlife. For the second summer running, swallows have failed to nest in the church porch.

On Remembrance Sunday, 13th November, there will be a service at 6.00pm with Deddington Brass playing for the hymns. There will be a retiring collection for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal and the churchwarden will be organising a village door to door collection in the week before 13th.

The next PCC meeting is scheduled for 11th October when plans for the remainder of 2022, including Advent and Christmas will be discussed. What is in the diary is a Fun Family Church Event and Christingle in the village hall on 10th December at 3.00pm and a Carol Service in church on 18th December at 4.30pm, with the return of seasonal refreshments afterwards.

But how often do we make intentional space and time to look after our spiritual wellbeing?

Making space and time individually and together as a community to look after our spiritually wellbeing is I would suggest an important part of our lives.

Whatever you might do for your spiritual wellbeing, it will be worth it, because as St Paul says in his letter to the Philippians, 'the peace of God... will guard your hearts and minds'.


