




Thanks to everyone who sent in photos, unfortunately there will be no Shutford Calendar this year, so here's a selection!

News from Thistle Hill...

Hello from Thistle Hill Allotments. I am writing just after the Shutford Festival and same as last year, after a long dry spell, the rain has finally returned - maybe we should change it to the Shutford rain dance. How

the rest of the summer turns out is anyone's guess.

4th of July is when I find that the majority of my first crops are ready to harvest: early potatoes, peas, broad beans, summer onions (Japanese), garlic, shallots, salad, carrots and beetroot. Yields have been variable, the potatoes suffering the most from the lack of rain.

Soft fruit has been good, plenty of strawberries and raspberries, the black and red currants are ready and gooseberries just about ripe.

The onion fly has returned, later than usual, just waiting for me to take off the netting. The summer onions and shallots escaped but the maincrop got hit fairly hard, but even so they seem to have shrugged it off and are now looking good.

Aphids have been particularly heavy this year but the main impact in the allotment has been on the broad beans and a quick wash with soapy water soon sorts them out. Not a massive crop but then again, you don't need that many. There's lots of other pests around: pea moth, carrot fly, cabbage white butterflies, slugs, and of course an explosion of rabbits this year.

The plots are looking good, but I haven't seen as many people up here digging this year. But there's still plenty of produce growing, sweet corn and maincrop potatoes are doing well, with runner and French beans inching up the poles. Squash and pumpkins are starting to take off and the ubiquitous courgettes are spitting out baby marrows whilst your back turned.

For those who are thinking that the season is over, we still have over 90 days of warm and frost-free weather until the start of October, so there are still plenty of things you can plant.

Here are 10 seeds you can sow now: spinach, chard, beetroot, carrots, Pak choi, Florence fennel, spring cabbage, cauliflower, kale and dwarf beans. Choose quick maturing varieties and many can

then be harvested as baby veg. If you sow most of them in modules, you can hold them back and slot them into the empty spaces as the earlier crops are harvested.

We hope to have a produce show to coincide with the Harvest Festival on 24th September with a Harvest supper and sale the next evening (more info closer to the time). As well as the usual biggest and best veggies, we can discuss the highs and lows, top tips, and successes and failures of the season. Hopefully with plenty of tea and homemade carrot cake thrown in....

Keep on digging as the wife says.



The Shutford Book Review

THE MAID BY NITA PROSE

The Maid is Molly, a young woman who appears to be on the autistic spectrum though this is never referred to explicitly. Thus she misinterprets other people and their actions leading her to move through life oblivious of some of what is happening. She works in a grand hotel (probably in North America though we are not told) and takes great pride in the order and cleanliness she imposes. Her small salary allows her and her beloved Gran to live simply but happily in a spotless flat in a seedy building.



Then she finds a body in one of her rooms. We now follow her as she is confronted by a frightening world of unkind police and colleagues who have major secrets. Fortunately she also finds real friends and help to navigate her way.

The author, Nina Prost, is described as an editor in the book but research reveals her to be the vice president and editorial director of Simon and Schuster Canada, the well-known publisher. This is her debut novel written before going into the office each day. As such we expect perfect presentation with a coherent plot and well-drawn characters. To a large extent she succeeds and it is certainly a good read, soon to be filmed. Book Club however had some reservations about the ending. This seems rushed and details are pushed in which should have come earlier. For some this spoiled the book. As a result we rated it 3 out of 5.

THE ENCHANTED APRIL BY ELIZABETH VON ARMIN



A chance finding of an advert in a newspaper leads to 4 women spending a month in an Italian castle by the sea. Strangers at first, with a desire to escape the dissatisfaction of their lives, the beauty and peace of their surroundings - blue skies, sunshine and abundant spring flowers - however casts its spell. Friendships develop and each begins to see a way forward. First published 100 years ago, it gives an insight into the lives of women in the 1920s although many of its themes remain relevant today. Charming and often humorous, this book will transport you to the Mediterranean and the joy of gardens in spring. It was voted 4/5 by us.





With longer day light hours during the summer, the illuminations are less effected, however, the lights come on about 8.30pm until midnight, with adjustments as the nights draw in.



Our Christian Aid collection raised £535 plus £108.75 Gift Aid. Thank you to everyone who gave money which can still be donated via the Christian Aid website or https://envelope.christianaid.org.uk/st-martins-church-shutford.

As reported last time, the existing PCC and officials were re-elected on 15th May to serve for a further year. There were only 8 people at the meeting which included refreshments and time to chat afterwards. Copies of the annual report and accounts are published on the village website. Our churchwarden was formally enrolled on 9th July by the Archdeacon of Dorchester, David Tyler at a service in Witney. There is a vacancy for a second churchwarden!

St Martin's Church, and the Wykeham Benefice, are in a strong position financially with higher church attendances boosted by special family occasions such as weddings and baptisms. The rector thanked those in Shutford who have helped and supported him during his ministry here.

St Martin's Church was pleased to host the weddings of Ben & Emily and Will & Dawn in June and to welcome their friends and families to these special occasions. The church was decorated with additional flowers which were left for us all to enjoy for a week or so afterwards. Another young village couple, Edward & Lucy, were married in Broughton on 8th July. We wish them all well during their married lives. There are plans for another wedding in September and a wedding blessing later in the year.

Reverend Neil Bowler's final service in Shutford was on 25th June after which he was thanked for his work as our Ideal Priest: he was presented with a cheque, some local honey and a coffee mug with sheep on it, representing his "Shutford Flock". Jake & Sara brought their son, Tommy Roy, to be baptised by Rev Neil later in the day: he was supported by his extended family, and we welcome him as a member of our church.

The Wykeham Benefice became vacant on 26th July. Rev Canon John Tattersall will lead a team of retired clergy during the interregnum and most services will continue as before. Lay people, including our licensed lay minister, Jocelyn Merris, will lead worship from time to time. Rev John

will be in the benefice at weekends but can be contacted at revjohn@ wykehambenefice.org.uk with enquires about baptisms, weddings and funerals at any time. The churchwarden is also a source of church related information. A meeting will be held in August to discuss the appointment of a successor to Rev Neil Bowler, but it is unlikely that a new priest will be in place until after Easter 2024. The Area Dean, Sara Sharp and members of the Dorchester Archdeaconry, will help us with the recruitment process.

A Churchyard Nature Hunt was held at St Martin's church in June and the results have been posted on the church noticeboard.

Most of the early summer flowers have faded with grasses again dominating – however there is lots of yellow lady's bedstraw and orange hawkweed blooming. Blackbirds and pigeons have nested in the churchyard but no swallows again this year. St Martin's Church has been given a Bronze Eco Church Award to celebrate the ways the church community in Shutford has engaged with caring for the earth as part of Christian Faith. With electrical work in church completed,

the PCC have asked our architect to draw up plans for plaster repairs and the complete redecoration of the building before the end of the year. We will also replace the pew cushions. We have received a legacy to help with the cost and funds from the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust should also be available. The annual OHCT Ride & Stride Event takes place on Saturday, 9th September raising funds for the trust and local churches. Village walkers and cyclists please take part this year.

Thefts from rural churches are still a problem so please report any suspicious activity: we are all members of our neighbourhood and must keep it safe.

Special thanks to the Shutford Festival committee for organising the event: a team of church members were pleased to serve tea and cake in the afternoon.

This year's Harvest Thanksgiving is on 24th September with a Produce Show and refreshments in Shutford Village Hall during the afternoon and a service in church at 6.00pm. A Harvest supper and sale will be held in the hall at 7.30pm on 25th September raising funds for local charities.

The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

23/029	Apologies for Absence: Cllr Paul Huewen
23/030	Declarations of Interest: None
23/031	Minutes of the last meeting: It was RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 10th May 2023 were a correct record (unanimous) and signed by the Chairman.
23/033	Matters arising from the minutes:
23/033/1	Tree above slide on Dairyground – The lower branches have been pruned but birds lime continues to be dropped on the slide. It was agreed that the crown will be lifted further.
23/033/2	Tree Survey – It was agreed that the clerk would ask the insurers how often a tree survey should be undertaken and depending on the answer book another one as the last survey was undertaken in 2018.
23/034	Parish Matters:
23/034/1	Footpath 346/18 from Ivy Lane to the Allotments – This has been reported to OCC as dangerous at the top where it is steep especially when wet. It was agreed that the clerk would chase this up with OCC. It was very overgrown at the top, but the vegetation has been cleared back.
23/034/2	Footpath 346/12 behind The Dairyground – Mr Mike Carwithen, Footpath Warden, has reported that this path is overgrown, and it is scheduled to be cleared by OCC.
23/034/3	Registration of the George & Dragon as an Asset of Community Value – The application has been submitted to Cherwell and further information provided subsequently. A decision is expected in August.
23/034/4	Erratic dog bin emptying – Cherwell have not been emptying the bins twice a week and this was reported by Mrs Debbie Pitt. Cllr George Reynolds has also taken the matter up with CDC and will follow this up again.
23/034/5	Telephone Box – This has now been refurbished and turned into a book exchange. Some books have been exchanged and residents are encouraged to use the facility.

23/035	Finance:
23/025/1	Accounts – The accounts to 3rd July 2023 had been circulated prior to the meeting. Allotment Reserves are currently £137.
23/025/2	Bank Balances – The bank balances on 3rd July were £16,681.75.
23/036	Correspondence:
23/036/1	Resignation - Cllr Paul Huewen has resigned. A vote of thanks was given for all his hard work especially with managing the allotments.
23/036/2	Pop up Bar – A local North Newington business with a boutique pop up bar operated from a vintage Citroen has offered to come to Shutford. It was agreed that this would be a good idea and it could possibly be co-ordinated with the pizza van. The Dairyground and the Village Hall are possible locations.
23/036/3	Glass at Bottle Bank – An anonymous email was received complaining about broken glass by the bottle bank. It was cleared up. It was believed that it occurred when the bins were last emptied, and CDC will be contacted to ask them to take care. Residents are also asked to take care when using the bottle bank and clear up if breakages occur.
23/036/4	Garden Waste on Allotment next to footpath from Ivy Lane to the Allotments – A resident pointed out that garden waste is being put on this allotment. The clerk will follow this up.

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
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
