It also symbolises Shutford as a place of work past and present: From the makers of Plush and artisan metal workers, to artists and designers, people working in offices, trades and professions and those working in gardens and homes - although there isn't room to depict them all!

IN REMEMBRANCE OF SHUTFORD SOLDIERS who lost their lives in WW1

As our memorial has been covered for its protection during the building works, we thought it would be fitting to remember them by researching their brief lives in this month of remembrance.

JOSEPH EDWIN BATCHELOR was born in Shutford in the summer of 1888, son of Frederick BATCHELOR of Little Bourton and Florence Annie STUCHBURY of Charlton by Newbottle. Frederick was an agricultural labourer and in 1881 was living with the White family, next to the George & Dragon (the site of the village hall) as a threshing machine labourer. Frederick and Florence married in 1883 and had 3 children but Frederick died at the age of 40 in 1895. Florence was remarried in 1898 to Jesse Smith and had another 3 children.

Joseph was a silk plush weaver before the war. He was a private in Queen's Own Oxfordshire Hussars, Household Cavalry and fought in France where he died of his wounds near Hazebrouck, Pas-de-Calais on 28 April 1915. He is buried there in the Communal Cemetery.

EDWARD HUNT was born in Shutford on 11 September 1888, son of Thomas Henry HUNT and Hannah WYATT. Thomas was a Shutfordian and married Hannah from Little Bourton in autumn 1879. The family lived on Cooks Hill where Thomas was a plush weaver and his parents were Edward HUNT of Eydon, Northants and Hannah GARRATT of Balscote.

Edward was one of 12 children, one of whom died as a child. He was a plough boy at age 12 and a waggoner by 22. He enlisted in Calgary, Alberta, Canada on 19 June 1915 and was a sergeant in the 50th Battalion of the Canadian Infantry when he was killed in action on 11 May 1917 in Pas-de-Calais, France. He is remembered on the Vimy Memorial.





GEORGE HENRY PAGE was the son of George PAGE and Emma MORRIS, and was born in Shutford in autumn 1893. His parents were married near Rugby in early 1891. George was born in Shipston-on –Stour, of a farming family who originally came from near Bicester; Emma was born in Yelvertoft, Northants. They lived in Grange Farm, Shutford.

In late 1911, George Henry married Mabel Elizabeth WEALSBY, born in Stanton, Gloucestershire and they had a son Frank in the summer of 1912. George was killed in action in Flanders, Belgium on 31 July 1917. He is remembered on the Menin Gate Memorial in Ypres.

Mabel was living in The Home Farm, Adderbury at that time. She later remarried in 1920 and had a daughter Betty with William Jason HONE.

THOMAS RICHARDS was born in Wroxton Mill in autumn 1888, son of John Joseph RICHARDS, gristman and Sarah WEST. John and Sarah were married in Ipswich, Suffolk in the summer of 1878 where Sarah was born. John was born in Warmington and after the marriage they returned to live in North Newington where John was a carter. They had 3 children before moving to Wroxton. By 1911, the family had moved to West Street, Shutford.

Thomas was a waggoner before enlisting, first in the Oxfordshire & Buckinghamshire Light Infantry and then the 1st Battalion Hampshire Regiment. He was killed in action on the Somme on 1 July 1916 and is buried in the Redan Ridge Cemetery No 2, Beaumont-Hamel, France.

ALBERT GEORGE MANN was also killed in action in Fampoux, Pas-de-Calais on 4 November 1917 but not included on our memorial. His wife Alice (nee COMPTON) was from Shutford. Albert's brother Horace was also killed in WW1 in Basra on 6 April 1916. Their parents lived in Moreton Morrell.

On Saturday 15thOctober this year I (Ken Griffin) and my partner Pam visited Shutford as my Grandfather, Fred Griffin was born there in 1892, and many of the Griffin's were Plush Weavers going back to the 1740's. Although I have been to the village twice before, once when I was 7 with my Dad, all that I remember on that occasion was the Church being on top of the Pub. The second time was a flying visit over 30 years ago to find any Griffin gravestones in the Churchyard (there appeared to be none) but I did come across the new graveyard on the Sibford road and stopped and looked out of my car window to see the gravestone of my Great Grandfather, Simon Griffin, without even getting out of my car!

This time I came armed with a photograph (attached) of a painting by W. Bamber of a row of cottages in Shutford that adorns the fireplace of the house of my Uncle Stan. He thought that it was probably where Simon might have lived. On my visit in October we first of all went to Banbury Museum and viewed their Plush exhibits and were able



also, to look at their notes and photographs of Shutford. Amongst the papers was the Obituary of James Griffin in 1946, the younger brother of Simon, which solved the mystery of their father's death (also James), as he died at sea going to America in the late 1850's presumably, looking for work. He left his wife, Louisa (Morgan,) with a family of eight children according to the 1861 Census, the youngest one, James, would have been under five when he left. Louisa later remarried in 1861 to George Nicholls.

In Shutford we visited the Church late on the Saturday afternoon and just as we were leaving around 20 people arrived for a beetle drive which would have taken place in the village hall had it not been pulled down, so I explained why we were there and what we were doing. We showed the photograph of the house to find out where in the village it was located. Everyone was extremely helpful and gave suggestions as to where it could be although it had probably changed in the last hundred years or so. Next we went down the steep steps to the George & Dragon with a welcoming roaring fire and a few of the locals having a tea-time ale. Again they were extremely helpful suggesting that it might be in Malthouse Lane or Cooks Hill.

We organised Sunday Lunch at the Pub and left to take photographs of the houses in the village and of the place where the Plush Mills were situated. We walked down Malthouse Lane and saw a similar house, then back to Cooks Hill where Simon lived from 1871 onwards. Having taken some photographs I explained to a lady who was tidying up her garden for the winter what I was doing and why, as it did look a bit suspicious taking photographs of all the houses in the street. She was again extremely helpful in trying to find someone who would know about the house in our photograph. She introduced us to Ken King who very kindly offered us tea while he went to find his archive of Shutford photographs so that we could try and confirm where the painting was taken.



Although we didn't have tea as the kettle had blown the electrics, he was extremely helpful and we went away with a photograph of the house many years later than the painting which I'm now sure is Simon's House in Cooks Hill.

The picture shows a lady in front of the railings which may be Simon's wife Maria (Lines) who died in 1912 and at the end of the railings are Bee Hives. In the Banbury and Shutford Plush book by Vera Hodgkins and Christine Bloxham it mentions that this was one of his hobbies. The Arch obviously has gone and has been replaced by a green wooden door, and the houses beyond have changed somewhat or did

the artist use artistic licence to make these houses similar to Simon's?

In writing this article we would like to express our gratitude and thanks to all the people that we met on that Saturday afternoon who kindly made our visit very memorable and contributed much to knowing more about the Griffin's of Shutford. The community spirit of the village still survives and it was a pleasure to meet and talk to the locals. May you all have a Merry Christmas and a good New Year particularly with the opening of the new village hall.

The council met in the games room of the George and Dragon. Once again many thanks to Paul for allowing us to meet there. We welcomed four members of the public as well as Cllr. George Reynolds

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Wednesday18 January 2017 at 7.30. Venue to be confirmed.

HIGHWAYS: The council has received some complaints about the way in which some residents and visitors to the village are parking. Councillors would like to respectfully remind everyone that they should be aware of potential dangers in parking partly on the pavement and close to corners where sight lines are restricted. Councillors have agreed to keep monitoring this situation.

SPEED CHECK: Cllr. Reynolds has kindly agreed to liaise with the company from whom we will be hiring the "speed trap" so that this can be installed as soon as possible. Thanks to those residents who put forward their views and suggestions as to where the "speed trap" might be best located and we have taken their views on board. This is the first step in trying to reduce speed through the village particularly as traffic enters Shutford from the Epwell Road. However, it should be noted that the PC does **not** have a statutory right to determine where speed signs and speed reduction notices can be placed. We can only make suggestions on the basis of evidence to the county council. We will, of course, be firm in our recommendations.

BUS SERVICE: The service funded by the Parish Council has now ended. Kevyn Powell, the organiser of the service, has praised the Parish Council as the only local council to have organised something for their residents. Kevyn has agreed to explore the possibility of combining the service with one that also serves part of Tadmarton. This would run on a Friday leaving Shutford at 10.00 and returning at 1.00. A fare would need to be paid. Please let me (Lynne Parsons) know if you would be likely to use this service. My telephone number is above or email me <u>lynneanda@aol.com</u> The more people likely to use it the more likely I can persuade Kevyn to organise it.

DEFIBRILLATOR: The council has agreed to purchase a defibrillator to be located centrally in the village. Cllr. Helen Gibbs has kindly agreed to investigate costings and placement involving the ambulance service and the British Heart Foundation. We hope to confirm this at our next PC meeting. If you have knowledge/would like to assist Cllr. Gibbs please contact her directly – telephone number above.

PUBLIC TELEPHONE BOX: BT has notified CDC that it proposes to remove the public telephone box. BT has informed CDC that (0) zero calls were made from the box in the last 12 months. Robust evidence is needed to make a case for retention of the phone box and Parish Councillors did not feel they could make a case rigorous enough to ensure retention of the call box. The consultation process finishes on 5 December. BT has guidance that includes examples of factors relating to retention of call box designated for removal – PhoneBoxRemoval_OFCOMGuidance.

PLANNING: The PC has now adopted a written planning protocol to ensure clarity when considering applications. As part of this protocol we agreed to publish notification of planning applications of interest to all residents. Planning application No. 16/02168/TEL56 is one such application, details of which can be found on the CDC web-site.

This was a busy meeting with many important decisions made; decisions which will improve the lives of all Shutford residents. Please support us by attending our PC meetings and contributing to the public session at the end of the meeting.



CHURCH NEWS

This year's Harvest Thanksgiving was held on 25^{th} September. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers, fruit, vegetables and produce. The following evening, 27 people came to the Coffee Evening in church and £216 was raised from donations for refreshments and produce. £200 has been given to Macmillan Cancer Support.

A Beetle Drive for families was held in church on 15th October. Only 16 people came to the church but those in attendance enjoyed the hour or so of fun: there was plenty of chocolate to be had with excellent refreshments at the end. With so few people wanting to attend our social events, any future ones may be in doubt: let's hope the building of the new village hall will encourage more people to join us.

Benefice Youth Group meets on a Thursday Evening during school term in the Sibford Quaker Meeting House with present age group 10 - 14. Meetings start at 7.00pm and youngsters from all benefice villagers are welcome to join.

Messy Church Events are planned for the Autumn: these are ideal for younger children and their guardians and include themed crafts and refreshments. The one held on 29th October in Tadmarton VH was in the morning with lunch. The theme was Saints and about 15 children and as many helpers attended. There will be another one on 19th November in Swalcliffe VH and on 10th December in Bishop Carpenter School North Newington: please encourage Shutford children to join in.

Our Remembrance Sunday Service at 6.00pm on 13th November was well attended with music by Deddington Brass. The retiring collection of £145 will be given to Royal British Legion, Poppy Appeal.

The church was open to observe 2 minutes' silence by the church Roll of Honour on Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday at 11.00am.

The PCC met on 18th October: matters discussed included finance, benefice activities and worship. The medieval font has been damaged over the years and the PCC have decided to have it repaired. Permission must be obtained from the Oxford Diocese and details of the work is held in church. The cost of the work will be about £2000.

Theft from churches is of great concern and roof and other alarms to deter thieves are being fitted. Any suspicious activity near the church must be reported immediately: there are no current plans to do any work on the outside of the church. Our local PCSOs are Lana Smith and Claire Brennan based at Banbury Police Station and they can be contacted on 101. Also, note Crime Stoppers number: 0800 555 111.

Advent Sunday is on 27th November and there will be the usual additional special services in the benefice between then and Christmas. Our Christingle service is on 18th December at 3.00pm with a collection for The Children's Society. There will also be a candlelit Carol Service on Thursday, 22nd December at 7.30pm. This year's Midnight Communion Services on Christmas Eve will be in Swalcliffe and Tadmarton. Christmas Day Holy Communion in Shutford is at 9.30am.

2016 has been a good year for overall church attendance with some good family occasions. Our core congregation is very loyal and generous and we have had good financial support from the wider community including **Illuminate and Celebrate**: **let`s light the church tower for the 12 days of Christmas partridge in a pear tree anyone?**

Best wishes for a happy and healthy Christmas and 2017: see you in church soon and remember without you there is no church.


Hannah works in the service department at Karcher's in Banbury and Shaun is a marketing executive for a publishing company in Leamington.

Hannah lists her hobbies/interests as an abstract landscape painter and a keen interest in property and interior design. Shaun is interested in absolutely anything sports related!



WINTER STARS DECORATE THE SEASONAL NIGHT SKY

With the arrival of the colder winter air and the ritual scraping of ice from the windscreen, everyone cannot be criticised for dreading the constant damp, and the threat of ice and snow to come. However, for stargazers and full blown astronomers it is the best time to observe the universe in all its glory as colder more stable air pushes away the last traces of any Autumn weather.

Just as the weather changes, the galaxy and nebulae laden constellations of the Autumn slip away into the evening twilight and the majestic Winter constellations begin to dominate the night sky. Already visible in the east and rising in the early evening is the superb constellation of Orion, easily recognised by its 3 'belt' stars Alnitak, Alnilam and Mintaka (Men in Black fans may already be familiar with these stars). The constellation Orion or 'The Hunter', according to myth placed amongst the stars by the Greek god Zeus, is a stunning sight on a clear night and contains examples of supergiant stars, stars of vastly different surface temperatures, colours and brightness's but most fascinating of all the superb Orions Sword nebulae, less inspiringly labelled Messier 42. Located just below the belt stars visible as a fuzzy patch with the naked eye, this nebula is a stellar nursery.

Young, extremely energetic stars are hot enough (+40,000 deg) to cause the surrounding gas and dust to glow, if you have binoculars take some time over this terrific object which is an incredible distance away, and as you

observe its glowing dust clouds ponder on the thought that, because of its distance and the finite speed of light, you will only be seeing it as it was, over 1,300 years ago. With clear horizons, the subtle orange colour of the planet Mars should help identify it as it remains stubbornly close to the horizon over the winter. Very good binoculars held steady enough or a moderate telescope will provide a distinct disc. Known in the past to be more Earth like, Mars today is cold and barren but still



a prime candidate for evidence of possible life. It will be joined in the western sky by the bright beacon planet Venus.

Reflecting almost all the sunlight falling on its toxic thick atmosphere it is a magnificent sight and can scintillate when close to the horizon, but its beauty hides a hostile and harsh world beneath the clouds for the unsuspecting adventurer.

The Gas Giant, Jupiter, the biggest planet in our solar system begins December as a morning object rising around 2am, will rise around midnight by the end of January. Well worth staying up for as binoculars will not only resolve the disc but also the 4 Galilean moons orbiting this incredible huge gaseous planet. Even a small telescope will show you its gas bands and the slightly squashed shape, the result of its high rotation speed causing it to bulge slightly in the middle - 1000 Earths could fit in its volume.

These are just barely a handful of examples of what can be seen in our wonderful night skies whenever it is clear and if you add to them the ever fascinating Moon, the Geminid meteor shower peaking on the14th of December and the Quadrantids peaking on the 3rd of January , Venus being a brilliant evening object especially in January and high overhead passes of the International Space Station and other satellites , there will be plenty of objects to observe over the next 2 months, hopefully through the binoculars or telescope you received for Christmas

CNAAG exists for everyone with an interest in space and the stars and our meetings are open to all. On Friday December the 9th, weather permitting,

we will be outside Jaffe & Neales bookshop in Chipping Norton from 5 -9 to observe the Moon, Venus, Mars and Orion - if you are free , come along and meet us and join in the fun. January could also be BBC Stargazing Live and CNAAG will be participating and holding several events over the month , please keep an eye on the CNAAG website.

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
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
