SHUTFORD VILLAGE HALL

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - May 2016

Activity in the Hall during the 2015-16 year has shown a marked reduction largely due to the Mums and Toddler group finally ceasing their activities after the Summer school term. Some considerable efforts were made to keep the group going but the lack of toddlers in the village was a problem they could not solve. Wendy is hopeful of a revival and is actively pursuing leads that could get something underway towards the end of this year. The Church has been using the hall to good effect with their PCC meeting, seasonal functions and fund raising activities. The usual Parish Council meetings, the WI, only 4 private bookings, administration of the hall and Festival meetings provided the remaining activities.

We welcomed Lena Cusiter as the WI representative following the resignation of Lynne Parsons at the end of July. Rita Livesey volunteered her services and was co-opted at our November meeting. Cleaning services were again provided by a village youngster and Jessica Newport has been carrying out a fortnightly duty since October.

Maintenance has again been restricted to essential repairs with yet another door handle replacement and a water leak in the lady's toilet traced to a plastic water pipe having been gnawed through by a rodent! Attention to a sticking main entrance door has been a continuing problem largely due to the exceptionally wet autumn, winter and spring seasons we have experienced, not helped by the very humid interior caused by seepage through the roof.

The project to replace the hall has been the main activity of the committee during the year. The Parish Council called in the help of ORCC to organise a survey of all the households in the parish to determine their views of an increase in the parish precept on the council tax to repay a £150,000 loan over 25 years, which produced 57.3% in favour. We were also advised that 54 households who did not return the survey would have voted in favour with a 95% confidence level. This raised the expectation of the committee and most of the villagers that the Parish Council would go ahead and apply for permission to borrow and take out a Public Works Loan. At the September Parish Council meeting, attended by a large number of villagers, the vote was 2 in favour and 5 against! Our committee was astounded and dismayed not least by the Council being unwilling to reveal any formal reasons for

their decision. Informal discussions arranged with some councillors a week later made no progress whatsoever, but affordability by some people seemed to be the only cogent argument against. Later, it was admitted by ORCC that their assertion regarding confidence in the extended result was wrongly given and that the only meaning was that 57.3% of those that voted were in favour, and nothing more.

In an attempt to ensure that all people had opportunity to support or oppose the committee's plan to rebuild the village hall, an open meeting was arranged and held on February 4th, independently chaired by Michael Robarts, a councillor from Balscote. One of only 5 villagers to have actively and extensively opposed the plan was invited to express his views along with one villager who expressed strong support for the plan, before opening the meeting for discussion. The meeting went very well indeed and a simple count of hands revealed an increase of those in favour of the plan after hearing the detail of the scheme and why it was necessary for the future of our village. As a way of confirming the urgent need for replacement of the village hall an independent survey of the building was commissioned and conducted on 11th January by Leys Longden & Co. This confirmed extensive damp largely due to an insecure roof allowing water ingress to the vaulted original ceiling and a serious crack in the concrete foundation slab that was the root cause of the deterioration of the vinyl floor covering across the width of the hall.

The Parish Council were then asked to consider a revised loan over 50 years to reduce the precept increase and this was agreed at their March meeting. However, they intended to carry out a further village survey and made it quite clear that other unspecified conditions would also be taken into consideration. It was because of this that the committee decided to withdraw their request for a public works loan and pursue other ways of achieving a more rapid start to a revised project.

Finally, we would like to thank our major benefactors for their generosity and patience. The many pledges of financial and practical help from villagers who are supporting our project are very much appreciated and special thanks must go to Gordon Freeman for his expertise and dogged determination to see the project to completion.



Shutford Book Club


The Shutford Book Club meets on the last Monday of each month at 7.30pm in The George + Dragon restaurant.

Shutford hedgehog supporters unite!



Great news – this year's Shutford Festival will be host to Warwickshire Hedgehog Rescue!

Brian Scott and his wife Jeanette will be bringing a stand to the event to help guide Shutford's growing army of hedgehog supporters eager to help their spiny friends.

Many Shutford residents have already pledged to help create

Hedgehog Highways. Others have even fostered juvenile hedgehogs over the winter to help bring them to a healthy weight in order that they can be released back into the wild come warmer months.

It's all in a good cause. Although hedgehogs were voted Britain's most loved species in a recent BBC wildlife poll, there has been an alarming fall in numbers, much due to habitat decline. The People's Trust for Endangered Species estimates that a third of the hedgehog population has been lost in the last ten years, a decline as rapid as that of tigers worldwide.

We can all do our bit to help Shutford's hedgehog population, and it doesn't take much! Here are three simple things you could do right now...

- 1. **Cut a small, CD-sized hole in your fences**, or create a small tunnel under boundary walls to enable any hedgehogs that might visit us to forage for food, find appropriate nesting sites and seek mates.
- 2. **Create a small wildlife area in your garden**. Leave an area of long grass, and create log and leaf piles to provide foraging and nest places for the perfect hedgehog habitat.
- 3. **Set up a feeding station** with dog/cat food NOT BREAD AND MILK! See the panel for guidelines.

If you want to go a stage further, you can even **foster a hedgehog** and help bring it back to a healthy release weight – details are on the web

site <u>www.warwickshirehedgehogre</u> scue.org.



Or simply **Adopt a Hedgehog** in a scheme run by the **Warwickshire Wildlife Trust**. £25 will give you a pin badge, adoption certificate, fact sheet, poster and window sticker – as well as your chance to follow a hedgehog's story.

How to make a hedgehog feeding station



Option 1Paving slab on bricks.

- Leave a ½ brick gap to give access.
- Place the food and water bowls around the corner.



Option 2 Plastic box.

- 1. Get a plastic box, about 12" wide, 18" long and 6" deep.
- 2. Cut a hole 4" x 5" in one of the short ends. Use a box with a lid, or turn it upside down.
- 3. Put the food at the opposite end so that a fox or cat cannot put their legs in and pull out the food. Place a saucer on top as extra precaution: the hedgehog will knock it off to get at the food.
- 4. Put a brick or heavy weight on top of the box, to stop it being knocked over.
- 5. Place the box with the entrance facing a wall or fence, or place a brick 4"to 5" in front of the entrance to help stop cats etc. from getting at the food. Hedgehogs love to go down alleyways so will get into the feeding station without any problems!

What to feed hedgehogs

*** Leave fresh water at all times! ***

DRY: A mixture of any of the below will be good for their digestion and teeth.

- Mixture of peanuts, sunflower seeds, dried mealworms and cat biscuits.
- Spike's Hedgehog Food or other specially prepared hedgehog food.
- Mixed bird seed.





WET: (any leftovers must be removed each day)

- Tinned cat or dog food, with white meat flavours preferred e.g. chicken, turkey and rabbit. Beef and duck flavours will also be eaten, but not fish flavour.
- Cooked chicken, excluding fine bones.
- Avoid offal and pork.



'A Miniature Garden Fit for a Queen!' Competition celebrating 'The Queen's 90th birthday'





The idea of the garden is to create a visual "royal themed" small garden on a



tray, plate, small plant pot, plastic container, you choose. Maximum size 50 x 50 cm.

Suggestions as to natural components to use are soil,

moss, flowers, twigs, pebbles, sticks, craft items, vegetables etc (no artificial plants). Decorate with small toys or a small mirror which could be used as a pond. The plants (or part plants) are not expected to be planted or growing and will usually have been picked that day.

THE NIGHT SKIES OF SUMMER

The late spring and summer months do not really provide the ideal conditions for the average stargazer as the longer days play havoc with the body clock leading, more often than not, to a yawny and bleary eyed trip into work the next day.

However to offset that, the warmer nights do make for much more comfortable and sociable astronomical evenings. It is at this time of year that the inquisitive stargazer's attention switches, not only to careful observations of our nearest star, but sitting back in warm dry conditions, breathing in the aroma of fresh cut grass and taking time to observe the Milky Way in all its glory.

As midnight slips away attention can then turn to searching for the faint galaxies and nebulae far out in the depths of space.

Stargazers may have already noticed the unmistakable bright giant planet Jupiter shining brightly to the south after the sun has set. Moving ever closer to the sun we will start to lose it in the twilight quite soon so take time to observe this magnificent planet and its fascinating moon system either through good binoculars or a medium sized telescope.

However, just past south after sunset and visible into August is the unmistakable red/orange disc of Mars, followed closely by the less bright but the 'must see' planet of them all, Saturn and its stunning ring systemguaranteed to take your breath away. Observers, on a clear night will also be able to make out 3 bright stars which make up the famous Summer Triangle, a collection of 3 constellations - Cygnus , Lyra and Aquila - their respective brightest stars making up the points of the triangle. Interesting to note that on any clear moonless night, the thin wispy band of the Milky Way cuts a swathe through the triangle and it is the perfect time to lay back under the stars with a pair of binoculars and tour the starfields and get to know our own home galaxy.

If you add in the spectacular Moon as it phases every month , the night skies at this time of year are simply stunning and the Chipping Norton Amateur Astronomy Group invites you to come along to any of our meetings , or alternatively we can come to you.







