



Trustees Report for the Year 01/04/2016 to 31/03/2017

This organisation is a charitable trust originating from the gift of land in 1954 for a community building to be used and managed by the parishioners of Shutford and their community groups, who are entitled to representation on the management committee in accordance with the conveyance of the land, our governing document.

This year has seen the most significant development of the charity since the opening of the hall in May 1954. The original building was a second hand prefabricated concrete structure with a corrugated asbestos roof. It had been improved and developed over the years and subsequent fund raising had been reserved for replacement of the roof, which had deteriorated to the point that it was beyond economic repair. However, a professional survey of the building also revealed other significant faults including a crack across the concrete slab upon which the building had been erected and that the facilities for disabled access were totally inadequate. Benefactors in the village had already pledged about a third of the cost of a new building and the villagers had voted in favour of taking out a public works loan to cover half the cost which together with reserves, held by the charity, would fund a new hall, for which planning permission had already been obtained. However the funding through a public works loan had fallen into difficulties, delays and uncertainty of outcome.

A decision was made to find other ways of financing a new village hall and a revised plan was submitted to Cherwell District Council for a less expensive proposal. Cost reductions were achieved by a complete review of the fenestration of the building and a change from stone frontage with the remainder rendered, to two small front curtain walls of local stone to the main hall, and oak cladding of the rear and side faces and the service block. Pledges from local tradesmen to carry out carpentry, plastering, electrical work and decorating in a second phase resulted in a total project cost estimate of £220K, down from around £300K. An appeal to villagers produced pledges and

donations of £29,623 plus £6,991 in HMRC Gift Aid. Negotiations with our preferred contractor, Genesis Construction, resulted in an agreement with them to carry out all the groundwork, and erection of a bare shell of the building for around £170K, as a phase 1 of a two stage project. Accordingly a contract with Genesis was signed in August and the site handed over to them on September 19th 2016, for the demolition of the old hall, re-contouring of the land and the construction of a bare shell.

By the end of this reporting period, the bare shell was only days away from being handed back to the Committee for implementation of Phase 2, the internal fit out, for which an enormous amount of help has been pledged by local tradesmen, material suppliers and villagers. Confidence was high that funds would be raised to enable completion of the project by mid-2017, and the commitment of the village to the project enabled external funding of £29,750 to be obtained from 9 different sources including The Big Lottery, during the financial year. Also during this period the village Summer Festival, Easy Fundraising, from on-line purchases, and the Hundred Club contributed an addition of almost £4K towards the project.

With the old hall closing in September, we only had five months availability of a village hall which continued to be used by the Church, The Women's Institute, Shutford Parish Council and a few private and fund raising events. It was somewhat apposite that the last event held in the hall was the wedding reception of Dot Harvey, who in her late 70s met with an old flame from her school days, Peter Rogers, with whom she left the village to move to Banbury. Dot was for many years the treasurer for our village hall and was a regular fund raiser for Kathryn House Hospice.

It is with huge gratitude we must thank all those who have helped with this project both financially, with skills, expertise and shear dogged determination. Our major benefactors the Cadbury family, Tim Rootes and Obbie Waller deserve to have a special mention for providing half the funding as do the many villagers who mostly chose to contribute anonymously. The whole project was also designed and co-ordinated by our surveyor, Gordon Freeman to whom we extend special thanks. Operational advice was at hand from Community First Oxfordshire and legal and financial guidance from Critchley's in Oxford. Finally we thank the Church, Anne and Bob Pritchard for providing venues for our 6 committee meetings held while we were without a village hall and Bart Patrick for accommodating the interior furnishings etc., while the new building was under construction.

We welcomed one member of the public as well as Cllr. George Reynolds.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Wednesday 8 November 2017 at 7.30p.m in the village hall.

Councillor John Yeomans — Parish Councillors were very sad to hear of the death of Cllr. John Yeomans whilst on holiday in Canada visiting family with his wife, Ann. We extend our heartfelt condolences to Ann and to Barbara and George Reynolds. John worked tirelessly as a councillor for the village, particularly ensuring that the village assets and Dairy Ground were maintained, often carry out repair work himself. He will be greatly missed by his fellow councillors. In memory of John councillors have agreed to donate £25 to Cancer Research as requested by Ann. We will also be placing a park seat on the Dairy Ground in his memory.

SPEED CHECK: Most villagers will have noticed that the PC has purchased and fitted "Twentys Plenty" signs at the entrances/exits to the village. Many thanks to Cllrs. Goldie and McEwan for undertaking this work. Inevitably it will be difficult to monitor the effectiveness of these signs, and the council would be grateful if villagers can provide us with relevant feedback when possible. This is the start of our work in trying to ensure vehicles travelling through Shutford watch their speed. Next we will be inviting the safety and transport officer at OCC to come to the village and carry out a technical assessment.

HIGHWAYS: The PC is well aware of the frustration experienced by many villagers due to the various road closures in and around Shutford particularly on the Epwell Road. Hopefully, this is now at an end.

However, this has left the road surface on the Epwell Road in a very unsatisfactory state. The clerk to the PC will be writing to the Highways Dept. at OCC to see what repairs can now be undertaken.

De-fib TRAINING: Thanks to Cllr. Gibbs for organising this very successful training. More is planned – see separate notice in the Shutford News.

ALLOTMENTS: After various conversations with allotment holders the PC are pleased to confirm that the waiting list is much reduced with the expectation that the waiting list might be cleared by the end of this month. Allotment rents are due at some time during this month, and the clerk will be sending out letters with details about the amount to be paid and when. Allotment holders should note that at our next PC meeting in November all rents will be reviewed with a view to a rent increase from September 2018. At this point allotment holders will be informed of the new rents to be paid from September 2018.

DAIRYGROUND: ROSPA has carried out an inspection of the play equipment on Dairy Ground and all is in a state that satisfies them. However, councillors feel that the time is right to start replacing some of the play equipment that has been in place for many years. We are still waiting for the see saw to be repaired – it is unclear why this has been delayed and the clerk is following up on this. Costs for replacing the baby swings will be made available for our next meeting for action. Councillors have also agreed to get the trees cut back and at the same time look at and sort the tree in Church Lane that may be impacting on the telephone wires.

VACANCY ON THE COUNCIL: After the sad death of John we have a vacancy on the Parish Council. The clerk to the PC will post a notice on the notice boards by 15 September. There is then 14 working days for 10 electors to apply for an election. If no election is called villagers will be asked to express an interest in becoming a Parish Councillor. At our November meeting councillors will hear statements from anyone wishing to become a councillor and a decision will be made to elect a new councillor. For information: the next Parish Council elections will be held in May 2018.

As chair of the PC I am delighted at how well councillors are at working together as a team, and making significant improvements to the environment.

The annual Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust Ride and Stride took place on Saturday, 9th September. We had 28 riders visiting the church during the day and 7 volunteers were on hand to welcome them with refreshments. We had hoped that some of our village walkers and riders would have taken part but sadly this was not the case.

The PCC met on 19th September and reviewed activities since the May meeting. The present financial situation is sound thanks to the generosity of our regular worshippers and the donation received from Shutford Festival. Day to day costs are being covered from general income with sufficient funds available for our planned restoration work and maintenance. Work on the font should be completed in the next couple of months with some remedial works on the electrics done. There have been minor problems with the heating system and we await suggestions for updating it to a more efficient one.

Ben Revill did three months volunteering with us for the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. We are grateful for the work he did for us.

The Harvest Festival was held on 24th September with a Ploughman's Supper and Harvest Sale in the village hall on the following Monday. A donation from funds raised will be given to Katharine House Hospice.

Michaelmas Day is the feast of St Michael the Archangel, celebrated on 29th September. Michaelmas Day is traditionally the end of the harvest season and therefore we have our Harvest Thanksgiving on the last Sunday of September.

The harvest season used to begin on 1st August and was called Lammas, meaning "Loaf Mass". Farmers made loaves of bread from the new wheat crop and gave them to their local church: this has happened in Shutford but the wheat for the bread may not have been grown locally. Nowadays with more diverse crops the harvest times vary and seem to start earlier than in the past.

Ecclesiastical Insurance insure our church buildings and contents and are concerned about an ongoing problem with theft of metals nationwide. Alarms and special paints are used to deter thieves but we need our neighbours to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity around the church to the police and churchwardens.

This year Ecclesiastical celebrates its 130 anniversary of insuring Anglican churches. The words of St Matthews Gospel and an accompanying prayer will be used at our meetings for the next few months.

We plan to have a Beetle Drive, a Souper Saturday and a Messy Church Event during next three months, subject to the availability of the village hall and our regular supporters. Dates and times will be published shortly. There will be additional special services during Advent.



AUTOMATIC EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING (FREE)

We have already held one successful CPR and AED training session in the village hall which was well attended and well received. Villagers were surprised to learn how the defibrillator works to reset the heart's beat, that it will not allow a shock to be administered unless its needed and how simple the machine is to use. Basic CPR and the recovery position were also covered. The message we took away was doing 'something' could save someone's life.

We are very grateful to the British Heart Foundation who awarded the AED and cabinet to the village through their grant scheme, to Ian Jones from The South Central Ambulance Trust for giving the free training in the village, to the Village Hall Committee for providing the venue free of charge and to Margaret Holloway for regularly checking the AED to make sure it is in working order.

There are 20 places available at each session, if there are not enough people they will not run.

If you would like to attend a training session but cannot make either date please contact Helen to let her know. If there are enough interested people another training session will be arranged.

The Ambulance Trust has provided the following guidance for using an AED.

Public Access Defibrillator (PAD)



Awareness & usage notes

It is important to remember that your safety is the top priority at any incident you are involved in. If you follow these steps, they will guide you through what you need to do.

- (1) D Check for any danger to you and to the casualty. Is it safe for you to approach the incident? If not, stay back, call 999 and keep yourself and others safe.
- (2) R If you think it is safe, check to see if they respond to you. Tell them to open their eyes, squeeze a finger nail & tap their shoulders.
- (3) Shout for help or call 999 get help coming to you.
- **(4)** A With the casualty flat on their back, look in the mouth of the casualty for anything that should not be there, i.e. sweets, food, loose false teeth, vomit etc. Remove anything that shouldn't be there. Tilt the head back as this will move the tongue away from the back of the throat and clear their airway.
- **(5) B** Next is to see if they are **breathing** normally. Place your ears next to the casualty's mouth and look down their chest. Listen for 10 seconds. You need to hear at least 2 good breaths. If you do not, the casualty is assumed to be in cardiac arrest. Start CPR and send someone to get the AED (automatic external defibrillator).

One person needs to start chest compressions **at once** while another person gets the AED access code from the 999 operator and goes off to collect it. Compress the chest twice a second and to 5-6cm deep. When the AED arrives, turn it on by pressing the green button and follow its spoken instructions. You may need to dry or shave the patient's chest & move any jewellery out of the way. The AED will decide if the casualty needs a shock, not you, so you can't deliver it incorrectly. Make sure no one is touching the casualty when the AED analyses the patient and gives a shock. Remember, you must only use the AED on someone who does not respond to you AND who is not breathing normally. You can only get the access code when you call 999.

News from the Bottom

As is customary for the post summer period, this report upon the events and personalities in the Bottom is a brief summary with a more details in the next edition of Shutford News. Meantime, readers will be interested in, and perhaps a little intrigued by, the headlines:-

Mayor fights back in court case to determine right to be mayor. Claims that original Wroxton Mill was located upon the site still owned by the Perry family and so the office of mayor remains with him. Letter by Mr Perry to the editor of the Shutford News embargoed pending legal opinion. Court reserves judgement pending land registry and psychiatric reports. Mayor submits planning application to build a theme park and funfair. All rides to be free, the mayor being keen to maintain his reputation for taking everybody for a ride.

The Lord May expresses concern about the Soar bottom. Apparently the bed has become silted and his lordship feels that the bottom should be thoroughly dredged. The Alderman has been deputed to get to the bottom of the matter.

Final arrangements have been concluded for the Bottom to twin with a town in Italy. Arsoli, a small suburb of metropolitan Rome in the region of Lazio has been selected. Arrangements for reciprocal civic visits are well advanced with the Bottom representatives already adept in singing its twin town's anthem, 'Ah soli mio'.

Other news in brief:- First test run of the planned Grand Prix circuit is scheduled for 6.30am on the second Sunday in November. A temporary pits area will be created on the Dairyground and spectator facilities will be provided outside what used to be the village pub.

There will be a first meeting this year of the Shutford Ski and Toboggan Club. The committee are likely to endorse the club rules from previous years – all runs will be uphill with the ski lift being only used for the downhill return – skis to be worn at all times in the clubhouse – guests welcome but they must bring their own snow. The campaign for the Bottom to secede from UK rule, BOTOXIT, went to the polls in June. The result however is not yet being announced as there appears to have been some voting irregularities; more votes cast than the number of electors registered.

The Mayor and the Alderman wish all Shutford residents a happy Autumn and a safe passage through the Bottom.



Summer Bird Walk

On a beautifully sunny morning back in June, ten villagers met at the bus stop for an early morning bird walk led by village bird expert Steve Holliday. Steve was, until recently, RSPB Midlands Regional Director, leading conservation work to halt and reverse declines in birds in the wider countryside, and managing and developing new nature reserves.

Before setting off we counted more than a dozen species: Swallow, Robin, Starling, Greater Spotted Woodpecker, Goldfinch, House Sparrow, Blackbird, House Martin, Swift, Jackdaw, Wood Pigeon, Collared Dove and Stock Dove. Steve explained that we have a population of Stock Doves in Shutford. Many of us had



not appreciated that these birds are different from their close relative the more common Wood Pigeon, although they can be distinguished from them as they are smaller, have

iridescent green markings on their necks and don't have white on their neck feathers or wing edges. From the bus stop we set off up Church Lane where we heard the beautiful songs of two



small birds that we identified as a Chaffinch and a Wren. Everyone was impressed by how loud the Wren's song was, particularly as the bird itself is so tiny. We learnt that the Wren's Latin name

is Troglodytes Troglodytes, which means cave dweller. Wrens do prefer dark places and need a loud voice to penetrate their deep woodland cover.



As we entered the field at the top of Church Lane we spotted a Mistle Thrush and heard its distinctive loud "tuk tuk" call. Mistle Thrushes have declined in gardens in recent years so we are lucky to have a breeding pair around Shutford. They have a rasping 'football rattle' call that can be heard when they fly over the village. Later on the walk we saw a Song Thrush which has become more common in gardens recently. It's smaller and less upright than the Mistle Thrush with arrow shaped spots and a warmer brown colour. We also spotted pheasants, a small flock of Greenfinches and a Common Buzzard circling overhead. We stopped and enjoyed watching Swallows, Swifts and House Martins flying and Steve explained how we can identify the birds on the wing. Swallows have a long deeply forked tail and long angled wings which they flap frequently during flight.

House martins have a fluttery flight and a distinctive white rump and a short curved tail. Swifts also have a short tail but have large sickle shaped wings. They glide often at great speed and can be heard screaming as they fly.

Steve asked if any of us had seen Merlins flying over the fields among Swifts and Swallows which they will predate upon in mid-air.



Merlins are often mistaken for Kestrels, a bird of similar colour and size. Kestrels are larger and have distinctive chestnut upper parts where Merlins tend to appear more grey.

We moved across the next field where we saw a Sparrow Hawk flying above a hedge which is where it likes to hunt for small birds. We then saw the third bird of prey of the morning, a Red Kite, and heard the beautiful song of a Sky Lark soaring high above the field.





As we headed towards the copse on the way to Jester's Hill, Steve told us this is a great habitat for small song birds. We heard a Willow Warbler singing and learnt that this small migratory visitor is visually very similar to the Chiff Chaff, another migratory bird with a distinctive call. We saw Blue Tits and Linnets and Yellow Hammers around the copse and hedgerows, although the White Throat Steve had been hoping we would see, or at least hear, was not about on this particular morning.

By the end of the walk we had seen twenty seven bird species in an hour and a half. We are lucky to have a diversity of habitats in our environs and although many species are in decline, such as Sky Larks, Linnets and Yellow Hammers on arable land, we also have a variety of woodland, mature trees, gardens and buildings, which attract a wide variety of bird species. We're planning another bird walk with Steve, earlier in the breeding season next year - we'll keep you posted.
