### Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2018

This organisation is a charitable trust originating from the gift of land in 1954 for a community building to be used and managed by the parishioners of Shutford and their community groups, who are entitled to representation on the Management Committee in accordance with the conveyance of the land, which is our governing document.

At the end of the last report, the bare shell of our new village hall was about to be handed back to the trustees, and this was duly done by our contractors, Genesis Construction, on April 11<sup>th</sup> 2017 albeit some of the groundwork still to be completed. Our management committee continued to pursue all available sources of funding for general and individual parts of the fit-out project and to call in the many pledges received from villagers to carry out specialised work towards the building completion. Not all grant applications received approvals, but 5 new grants were received from external sources and 3 additional financial contributions came from local residents. It was disappointing that a grant from the Parish Council was not approved by a small margin but on-going activities by the Committee during the year raised approximately £6,000.

Completion of the building started with the installation of the insulation materials beneath the floor, in the roof and walls, enabling the pledge from TOE2 to be claimed. Much of this work was carried out by villagers in their free time as were internal linings, carpentry, plumbing, electrics, plastering and eventual painting. The Village Hall was given all the internal doors free of charge by a villager and they were fitted by a villager too. The choice of a heating system was made quite late in the project and a quotation from local agent, AC Electrical, to install 2 Mitsubishi Inverter air to air heat pumps, was accepted on a recommendation from a Committee member. Particular mention should be made also of our kitchen, which was supplied and fitted at cost and 50% funded by the Calor Rural Community Fund, made possible by a national vote in favour when pitched against a wide range of other worthy projects.

All the fit-out work carried out by contractors was zero rated for VAT but materials obtained for the DIY activities had to be obtained at the standard rate.

An opening date of 14<sup>th</sup> July 2017 was announced and invitations to the opening ceremony were extended to all those who had contributed, totalling 110 individuals. It is all these people and many more that the Trustees and Management Committee must thank most sincerely for making this project possible and a plaque acknowledging them is now mounted on the wall of the entrance hall. The opening ceremony on Bastille Day was blessed with gorgeous weather and attended notably by our original benefactor, Lord Saye and Sele and our newly re-elected MP Victoria Prentis. Everyone was favourably impressed with the new building and amazed that the old building had been handed to our contractor a mere 10 months earlier, and it had come in just under budget.

So, in this financial year we have experienced 7 months of use of the building and the only problem of any importance was the acoustics in the main hall, which has been improved substantially by the installation of sound absorbers, by the quaintly named company "The Woolly Shepherd", which make quite a talking point when first observed. Our original research around the district where village halls had been substantially renovated or replaced indicated that the efforts were rewarded with a substantial increase in usage. This has certainly been the case so far in our hall, where new activities include, a Supper Circle, Film & Book Clubs, various Craft & Exercise Classes, Music Evenings, Charity Coffee Mornings and numerous Children's Parties, crowd the booking calendar along with meetings of our traditional village organisations. But one very notable success is the Community Lunch on Thursdays, originally intended just to bring villagers together, but now provides substantial contributions to our funds.

In conclusion, it must be said that our new Village Hall has reinvigorated our Charity, brought many more villagers in contact with each other and is a valuable asset to the village, for which we are ever grateful to all those who helped, both financially and with their time, expertise and skills.

The final amount collected door to door during Christian Aid Week was £420. If you missed the collector, you can donate at caweek.org.

There was a good congregation at the Benefice Service at 10.00am on Sunday, 3<sup>rd</sup> June. The choir sang and others from across the benefice took an active part: there were refreshments in church after the service.

The Thursday Lunches continue and members of the church host one bimonthly raising about £300 for church funds so far this year.

There were 20 people at the Messy Church Event in Shutford Village Hall on 16<sup>th</sup> June. The theme was based on the "If I were a butterfly song" with lots of crafts to take part in. The afternoon concluded with refreshments which included sandwiches, butterfly cakes and ice cream.

A Messy Church was held in Tadmarton on 7th July. As it was a beautiful sunny day we met in the churchyard and made scarecrows ready for the village Scarecrow Festival. These fun events are always free of charge and are held every couple of months or so across the benefice: ideal for young children and their carers. Please join us.

A Junior Youth Group meets in Sibford each week and Shutford youngsters would be welcome. The annual Summer Soccer School takes place at Bishop Carpenter School North Newington  $1^{\rm st}-4^{\rm th}$  August: contact Margaret on 730315 for full details and to book.

The PCC met on 18<sup>th</sup> June. The treasurer reported an overall surplus of £760 at the end of June with regular donations and collections covering the cost of ministry. Other income from fees and fund raising covered general expenses.

We have since received £3500 from this year's village festival which will be used to pay our annual buildings insurance premium of about £2000 and future restoration costs.

The churchyard grass has been cut regularly by volunteers with the extension being done by David Lovesey as part of the parish council's open spaces grass maintenance. We are also grateful for assistance with the removal of grass by The Manor gardener. Some pruning back of ivy is needed with work on the hedge adjoining the village hall also. Swallows have raised a brood of chicks in the church porch. There have been small maintenance jobs undertaken in church and there is a need to replace some damaged plaster in the ceiling and on the walls. Lorna has cleaned the church as part of her Duke of Edinburgh Award work.

Congratulations to Rita Livesey and her team for organising an excellent festival and for all who helped in various ways, to set up, on the day and clear up afterwards. As usual there were lots of donations from villagers, sponsorship and support which made the day financially and socially a huge success. With music in the evening, non-residents have been attracted to the event bringing money into the village.

This year's Ride and Stride for Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust takes place on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> September. This event is a very important fund raiser for the trust enabling it to make grants to churches throughout the county. Sponsor forms will be available in church and hopefully local walkers and cyclists will be able to take part this year.

St Martin's Church was full on 28<sup>th</sup> June for the funeral of Neville Gunn who died recently after a long illness. We offer our sincere sympathy to Linda, Andrew and Keiron and their families.

Following the introduction of the new General Data Protection Regulation all church members and other supporters were contacted concerning methods of communication, church rolls and rotas.









# **Shutford Book Club**





# **Shutford Species - Pipistrelle Bats**

Shutford has a large colony of over 270 pipistrelle bats at Timbertons, the first house in Ivy Lane. Lena and Joe inherited the roost when they moved in and have seen the colony grow and increase significantly in recent years. The bats are an amazing sight as they leave the roost each evening around dusk. It's a maternity roost to which the colony of females returns each spring to give birth and raise young, dispersing in autumn, back to mating colonies in other roosts.



The numbers in this colony make it likely to be soprano pipistrelle. The colony and its size is a positive indication of the environmental health in and around Shutford. The UK has 18 bat species and 8 of these were designated as 'biodiversity indicator species' in 2008, by the Government's Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA). Indicator species help measure the levels of biodiversity in a region and the overall health of ecosystems. The eight bat indicator species are: lesser horseshoe bat, common pipistrelle, soprano pipistrelle, Daubenton's bat, Natterer's bat, serotine and noctule. Pipistrelles feed exclusively on insects, and a growing colony indicates a plentiful supply of insects in the area. Insects are at the bottom of food chains so a plentiful supply is also good news for other mammals, birds, reptiles as well as wild and garden flowers, that are insect pollinated.


Bats are excellent controllers of pest insects - a single pipistrelle can eat up to 3000 insects each night. In the US, Thailand and Brazil bats are being used increasingly for pollination and to protect crops from pests, reducing the need for pesticides.

Pipistrelles are tiny bats weighing only 3 – 8 grams, typically the weight of a 20p piece. They are around 3.5cm – 4.5cm long with a wing span of around 20cm – 23.5cm. They prey on all kinds of small insects: flies, midges, mosquitoes, gnats, and moths in a wide variety of habitats: In woodland, over water, gardens and agricultural land. They locate their prey in the dark by echolocation – they make a series of sounds and the returning echoes enable them to locate prey in their path. Their main predators are owls and domestic cats but the roost in Ivy Lane is pretty inaccessible even for cats.

**UK Conservation Status:** Common pipistrelles and soprano pipistrelles are the most common and widespread of all British bat species. There was a dramatic decline in pipistrelles during the last century but since 1999 there has been a partial recovery of populations.

According to the Bat Conservation Trust this is likely to be due to legal protection introduced in 1981 to protect bats and their roosts. Pipistrelles commonly roost in buildings so they have benefited from legislation on building and development and from improved public attitudes and awareness through positive media coverage.

Survey results from the National Bat Monitoring Programme show a steady increase in soprano pipistrelles (Pipistrellus pygmaeus) since 1999. The data is from 626 sites in England, Scotland and Wales.

The Bat Conservation Trust runs a National Bat Monitoring Programme to produce UK population trends that are vital to the successful of conservation work. They need 30-40 sites to be surveyed annually to help them provide country-level trends.
