THE SHUTFORD VILLAGE HALL TRUST

(Charity No. 304364)

It was with much sorrow that we needed to close the village hall on 18th March as the nation went into lockdown to slow the spread of the coronavirus which had been declared a global pandemic. At the time we were in the process of finalising our accounts for the year 2019-20 ready for presentation to the auditor and for the AGM which was scheduled for this month, but now postponed until some time when we can hold this in a safe way. However, I can report that the financial performance has remained strong for the year in which we only lost only two weeks income.

For those people who have paid in advance for bookings that cannot now be held, we will carry forward the payments to cover any re-arranged dates. If it is not possible to do this, then please ask for a refund. We cannot yet confirm a date when we will be able to re-open but have received guidance from our advisory body 'Community First Oxfordshire', indicating that July might be the earliest possibility. ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England) is working on precise details of the measures we will need to adopt and the numbers of people allowed in at any one time.

We will still be incurring costs for insurance, water, broadband and electricity and it is only for water that there has been any offer of help.

Some very good news can be reported about the steps connecting the village hall to the church. This project is now fully funded, following a successful application for a Lottery grant and we only await timing details from the contractor.

The 100 Club is running again with monthly draws taking place and winners being published as usual.

We must extend our thanks to those who are helping with security checks during the emergency and for the attention to the garden, so that our hall will be 'good to go' as soon as we are permitted. Finally, one thing that this emergency has highlighted is the enormous success our new hall has achieved in bringing people together and how much we all miss our community events.

Compost Corner Grow your Own Veg Ailsa Craig gives some timely advice


what fantastic gardening weather we have recently enjoyed, but watch out for late frosts as the temperature has plummeted. On Lockdown there is more time than usual to spend on the allotment, thankfully allowed. Just in the nick of time garden centres can now open, Hurrah I need new canes.. We just need some rain now, I wonder if Boris can fix that too!

Don't be a twearly

I admire the enthusiasm of those new to veggie growing but don't rush in. A late frosts can annihilate potatoes planted too early and not covered or earthed up at night.. It is still too early to plant out salad, courgette and tomato plants without protection – fleece or poly tunnel It doesn't have to be minus zero to have a frost. Harden off or acclimatise plants outside during the day, bring in at night, then on warmer nights leave them out. Its coldest at 'bout 3am, so be careful. Like me you will become a weather addict!

Courgettes.....

Cucumbers, Marrows, Squash & Pumpkins - can all be sown now indoors in compost in 3inch pots. The **secret is to sow the flat oval seed on their edge** about an inch down. Takes 14 days to germinate . When they have 4 true leaves, harden them off, plant out in containers or in the ground - dig a foot square hole, fill with compost or manure, leave a mound on top and plant the courgette to sit above ground level. Keep watered, they are thirsty plants - harvest a dozen courgettes per plant over the summer.



Beans, Beans, Beans....

Sow beans now - indoors in pots or outside, 30mm deep, keep moist, will shoot in 14 days. Most beans are natural climbers so provide support. A simple wigwam of 6ft bamboo canes with flowering runner beans is an attractive and delicious addition to any garden. **Runner Beans** - there is nothing like a young tender runner bean picked and cooked within the hour. Supermarket runners are old and tough and expensive by comparison. Runner beans like wet feet, prepare the ground or tub with plenty of rich organic matter - compost or manure. Plant out when the bean has developed at least 2 sets of real leaves, 2 per cane. Tie the first shoots to the canes, and water. Keep well watered, and protect from slugs remember the Beer traps! Start picking young plants in September.

Sweetcorn or Corn on the cob

Sweetcorn is a type of maize bred to have high sugar and low starch content – best cooked within hours of picking before all the sugar turns to starch, making it ideal for home growing

Pollinated by air rather than insects so they need to be in a friendly group!. Sow or Plant out in June in a block at 18ins apart in rich soil in full sun, water well at flowering time. May need staking – side roots will appear at base of the stem – just cover them over and don't hoe too closely. Do not remove any side shoots. You will get 2 or 3 cobs from a plant in September-October. The kernels develop in a sheath for protection the "flowers" – silks at the top will turn dark brown when ripe – to check press a thumb nail into a kernel the liquid from the kernels should be creamy – remove by twisting them from the stem. Enjoy on the BBQ! Tiny sweetcorn seedlings are delicious is stir fries or salads.






Fig. 55.—Young cabbage and other plants should be put into the ground as deep as their lowest leaves (B), not left with bare stem exposed as at (C). They recover from the disturbance of transplanting more speedily if lifted with plenty of soil at their roots (A)

Vegetables to plant out now include :

Leeks – with a stout dibber make 6inch deep holes 6in apart drop single pencil thick leek plants into each hole water in to the top – careful not to fill the hole with soil. Some soil will wash down to anchor the roots in the hole. **Broccoli - Cabbages , Sprouts , cauliflowers** – when 4 to 6 ins high, with 5 or 6 true leaves, plant out in rows 18 inches between each plant. Plant at depth to bury the lowest leaves – firm in and water well – see left.

I bought me cabbage plants at the Quarry Nursery at Hornton - healthy, excellent young veg plants at reasonable prices. This year Philip Gilbert is **only** doing click & collect, look at his web site quarrynurseries.co.uk .Contact Philip Gilbert on 07903655267.

Vegetables you can continue to sow outside now include :

Peas & Mange Tout – scatter in a 50mm deep 150cm wide trench, cover carefully, protect from birds with twigs or netting. They need to climb so put some net up, canes or twigs.

Carrots & Beetroot – sow successionally, thin out to 10cm spacing, use the small thinnings in the kitchen and leave the rest to mature. **Peppers & Aubergines** – start off indoors, best grown indoors in a greenhouse or conservatory.

Keep sowing **Salad crops - Spring Onions, Lettuce, Rocket, Radish, Swiss Chard, Spinach or Leaf Beet** – right start in pots or sow direct every few weeks. Leaves and stems can be cooked, or use in salads.

Stay home Stay safe and visit your local garden centre if open Bodicote Farm Shop, Farnborough Garden Centre and Cotefield Nurseries.

Church Lane... The Keswick Codlin Apple Tree

For 50 years we have enjoyed the blossom of this apple tree in Church Lane and have taken advantage of its windfalls (the best apple sauce)!

Predating the classic Victorian period of English apples, the original Keswick Codlin seedling was discovered in the early 1790's in a rubbish heap at Gleaston Castle, near Ulverston in Cumbria.

Local nurseryman John Sander from nearby Keswick propagated it, and it became popular with gardeners due to its early season and good flavoured



juicy cooking apples, as well as being a reliable cropper and relatively easy to cultivate.

Perhaps we could find someone who propagates heritage fruit



trees (with the Hodgkin's permission!) and plant one or more somewhere in the village, ensuring its continuity?

CHURCH NEWS

Because of the coronavirus, all services in church were suspended on 17th March and the church locked on 24th March until further notice. The Annual Parochial Church meeting was cancelled, as was Messy Church in Sibford and our Lent Lunch. The existing members of the church council will continue in their roles as will the churchwardens until it is safe to hold a meeting. The annual report and accounts have been agreed and copies are available in church when open or from KJJ: they will be published on the village website after the annual meeting.

Mothering Sunday flowers were distributed on 22nd March, the church tower was illuminated, and the bell tolled in thanksgiving. Some households lit candles as a symbol of hope in these difficult times.

With churches closed for worship, The Oxford Diocese has an online service on Sunday mornings at 10.00am via their website and is available after the event if this time is inconvenient. Since Easter Sunday there has been Benefice Eucharist also at 10.00am via Zoom. Reverend John is arranging this with technical assistance from Tim: see Wykeham Benefice website for details on how to join this service or contact KJJ, who can arrange a pewsheet with weekly readings and other information. There are a few Shutfordians taking part in the service with overall attendance more than a normal benefice one.

A new profile for the Wykeham Benefice has been agreed in anticipation of the appointment of a new Rector to replace Ronald. However, we have been unable to hold meetings and the vacancy has yet to be advertised with subsequent delays to our original plans. Any setbacks are small compared to other problems facing us and every effort will be made to support our community through lay ministry. We are grateful to members of our worshipping community who have continued to support the church financially at this time and others who have made various donations. Although our general expenses are minimal, we have a monthly commitment of about £800 to the Oxford Diocese and our insurance company, which cannot be cancelled. Income will be down this year with cancellation of services, weddings, fund raising etc. As we have been prudent in the past, there are reserves available to cover any small shortfall there may be. Once we can mix socially, we hope to do some fund raising but nothing is certain.

Although our Lent Lunch was cancelled, some of us had soup at home on 6th April and made donations to Katharine House Hospice.

Christian Aid Week was $10^{th} - 16^{th}$ May and as there was no door to door collection or fund raising in Shutford this year, it is hoped donations for this important charity can be made online: caid.org.uk.

Love never fails. Coronavirus impacts all of us. But love unites us all.

Since 9th April, the church bells have been tolled each Thursday evening to remember NHS staff and other key workers and on occasion the church tower has been illuminated. Thank you to JB for ringing the bells. Many of our regular congregation are in a high risk age group so are grateful to family and friends for their support. Also, to the many delivery personnel who come to the village with post, milk, groceries, papers, and other "essentials" which make life at home easier. Many of our villagers, who are at the centre of village activities, have had to stay at home so look forward to when it is safe to return to normal life.

The churchyard early summer flowers have started to bloom as have the white and purple lilac trees. Swallows have returned to the village and evidence of their nest refurbishment can been seen in the church porch. Although the church is closed, the churchyard is open for some peace and quiet but please take care when visiting, as the ground is uneven.

The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

Present: Cllrs: Helen Nixseaman (Chair), Sandy Forrester, Chris Hall, Debbie Pitt, Carolyn Rann, George Reynolds, Ashley Taylor and David Best, Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer. No members of the public attended the video conference.

20/001	Apologies for Absence: None.	
20/002	Co-option of Chris Hall Councillors voted to co-opt Chris Hall as a Councillors to replace Tom Parrish (unanimous).	
20/003	Declarations of Interest: None.	
20/004	Minutes of the last meeting: It was RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 11 th March 2020 were a correct record (unanimous) and signed by the Chairman.	
20/005	Matters arising from the minutes: The actions list was reviewed, and all actions had been completed except contacting CDC for an update on 944 restorations and circulating examples of emergency plans.	
20/006	Parish Matters:	
20/006/1	Verge Mowing – some complaints had been received about cutting the wildflowers with the verge mowing. It was agreed that a new map will be drawn which will indicate where there are wildflowers which should not be cut and a meeting would be held with the verge mower to go through the new map.	
20/006/2	Allotments – The allotments are looking fantastic and the Parish Council wishes to thank the all allotment holders for their hard work. The Parish Council has paid for a second water butt. The only vacant allotments are on the hill and there is no waiting list currently.	
20/006/3	Dairyground and Tesco grant – The play equipment will be opened as soon as possible when government restrictions have been lifted. The Tesco grant money, that was applied for over a year ago, has just been received. A condition of the grant is that it can only be used for the purpose for which it was applied for i.e. a community project. The nature sign will be funded from it. Any further expenditure will be discussed in future meetings.	
20/006/4	Coronavirus – It was agreed that residents would be asked if there is any further support that the Parish Council could provide.	
20/006/5	Defibrillator – The pads are currently OK. The battery warranty expires in August but there is a battery level indicator that is inspected regularly. It was agreed that the battery will be replaced when the weather gets colder in autumn unless the indicator suggests earlier replacement.





Shutford Book Club


The Shutford Book Club normally meets on the last Monday of each month in Shutford Village Hall 7:30 pm. During Lockdown this is being done virtually.

Allotment News...

If you have taken a walk around the allotment areas in Shutford recently you can see the allotment holders have been very busy. We asked the allotment holders a few questions:

What have you been planting since lockdown?

"Sowing out of date seeds and hoping that they germinate, as all the seed supplying websites went into meltdown."

"I've planted carrots, broccoli, cabbage, leeks, peas, spinach, lettuce, French beans, potatoes, onions, beetroot, and soon to be runner beans, as per advice from allotment neighbour Derek".

"Beans, peas & greens! We usually pick some different seeds every year along with the usual favourites. This year we've tried



Halloween pumpkins, sunflowers and funny looking squashes - fingers crossed!"

"Broad Beans, French Beans, Runner Beans, peas, cucumber, pumpkin, leeks, potatoes, broccoli, cabbage, Brussel sprouts, cauliflower, carrots, parsnips, beetroot and salad. We have gooseberries, raspberries and redcurrants too, but they grow every year."

"I took on the allotment at the beginning of the year, never having one before. I don't really know what I am doing, but I'm looking forward to the challenge of having a go. So far I've planted potatoes, which have just started to show, so hopefully we will at least have potatoes to eat, as well as Spinach & Swiss Chard. I have started from seeds, peas, dwarf beans, mange tout and broad beans. Courgettes, onions and garlic plants are looking good. "We seem to be a bit behind this year, but so far we have potatoes, broad beans, french beans, carrots and beetroot planted. A few asparagus crowns went in too."

What is the hardest thing to do with an allotment?

"Keeping at it when the weather's bad. Sowing seeds and hoeing

on a hot sunny day is rather lovely. Repairing rabbitchewn fencing in a howling gale can be less fun, as can rescuing blown out panes of glass from wind-battered greenhouses."

"Trying to keep up with the weeds."

"Weeds and water! We've tried to keep ours relatively low maintenance, but the weeds still give us a pretty good work out when they want to. With no mains water



supply at the allotments we learnt the hard way the first year and now rely heavily on our water butts if/when the hot weather comes."

"Weeding."

"We had lots of digging to do in the beginning, clearing lots of weeds and we have divided the plot up into different sections."

How do you fend off beasties on the allotment?

"With an Octopus called Jeff."

"Our labrador runs a few circles around the patch when we're up there and then we just hope for the best."

"Ignore them-just plant more. "One for the rabbits/deer, one for the slugs/pigeons and one for you."



What is your favourite thing about having an allotment?

"Eating Christmas Dinner knowing that everything on the plate is as

local as it can get. Digging up the first potatoes on a hot sunny day - it's like finding treasure. The camaraderie, as well as the peace and quiet. Taking five minutes to sit on the bench and watch kites and buzzards soaring above the field. The satisfaction of taking a tiny seed and nurturing it into full growth. So much of it is about hope, patience and the magic of nature and we all need that right now!"



"It's peaceful down at the allotment

and have been given lots of advice from Derek Turner and it's nice I've learnt so much about how village life was like years ago (social distancing of course)."

"Being at the allotments is a great fresh air fix and a welcome distraction from work, screens and the normal routine." "Time away from the rat race feeling closer to nature."

"I find the allotment to be a peaceful place to be, the perfect place to switch off and engross yourself in planning what goes where and when in the coming months, especially in the last few months with everything that has been going on in the world."



"Eating fresh peas and raspberries the moment they are picked, the sense of the seasons as the year moves on, fresh air, meeting people (at the prescribed distance of course) and, especially during lockdown, having a beautiful place to go to escape to for a while."

Do you have 'plot envy' looking at your neighbour's plot?

"Not envy, but admiration. And you always get great ideas from what other people do. The sharing and sense of community is one of the best things about the Shutford allotments and we are so, so lucky to have them."

"We're very lucky it's more of a 'taking part' culture at the allotments than 'top of the plots' but we're also very lucky there's no dividing fence with our neighbours who are much more experienced which really helps with ideas, tips and tricks. There are some lovely plots up there and with so many ideas and different ways of doing things which all helps towards working what crops grow well and not so well!"

"I like the variety of styles and whilst some are far neater than mine there are only so many hours in the day... (although more at

present apparently!)"

"I do look over at my neighbours and hope I can get mine looking like that, but with all the tips and advice I will get there."

"Yes! There are some beautifully well-kept and ordered plots - we have a bit of catching up to do."


