

Shutford Village Roles – Shutford needs you!

Shutford News:

The news is produced 6 times per year (bi-monthly). We are nearly up to its 40th year!! Its made up of copy that comes in from various organisations eg, Church, Parish Council, Book Club, Village News etc. As well as village editorial contributions.

Paid for advertising makes up for half of the edition (2021 adverts all booked and paid for).

The role requires collation & co-ordination of copy and creating a print ready pdf (there is a simple package that does this for you). Around 2-3 hours every other month.

Circulation of Village Emails:

The system used is Mailchimp, the database is held within Mailchimp and has around 200 emails. It's a very easy system to use, to set up the emails and add images. Usually takes around 5 minutes to set up and send an email. The content of the emails can be anything from advising people of the next Parish Council Meeting, Events in the village, etc

Updating Village website:

The site is currently up to date. As we progress out of lockdown there may be more activities starting up again and the website is there to promote these activities in line with the village emails. The updating is very simple to follow.

A full handover will be given for all the roles above.

The Churchyard Yew Tree

The churchyard yew tree was a seedling from our garden which I planted about 40 years ago, with the help of then churchwarden, Fred Sabin, thinking that the churchyard was its natural home.

It came from the magnificent yew tree in what was originally the garden of Barton Farmhouse, subsequently cut down by the builders of The Nook, where its remnants can be seen.

Every morning from early spring onwards a song thrush used to serenade us from its perch at the very top. We were all very upset at its demolition – Bobby, the George & Dragon's landlady at the time, threatened to lie down in front of the machinery, to no avail!

When Helen d'Ayala from BBONT, visited the churchyard in 2013 and surveyed the wildflowers (64 plant species, list in church), she remarked on the unusual shape of the yew tree, and what an asset it was for wildlife.

Kenneth John King

18th April 1947 - 22nd February 2021

Kenneth John King was born in South London in 1947 where he spent his younger years and then Buckinghamshire until the age of 21 at which point, he set off to see the world. First off, he was offered a job in Johannesburg, South Africa where he met his first wife Maria, and then São Paulo, Brazil where his twin sons, Adrian & Rowland were born. They moved back to the UK to be closer to family and for the boys schooling.

After a short stint in The Netherlands, Ken left his then home in Buckinghamshire to move to Shutford in late 1990. He was immediately attracted to the quaintness of the village as well as Hilltop Cottage, now Honeystone Cottage at the top of Cook's Hill.

Although very busy with a full-time career in sales management across various companies, travelling around the country and across the world, he immediately set out to entirely refurb the cottage. Martin Morris remembers Ken, in a "stylish blue suit, an immaculate shirt to match with French cuffs and well-polished shoes" and so was very surprised by Ken's hidden D.I.Y skills.

He also roped in his young sons at the time, Adrian & Rowland, to help with pulling down the old mud & horse hair plastering, as well as revealing the old inglenook.

Ken was a very active member of the village while he was living in the UK. He was on the Parish council for several years, organised the survey for the Village Plan which resulted in the telephone box refurb, played a key role at helping with the new village hall, was acting village archivist until he died and always volunteered in some capacity with The Summer Festival, sometimes as “bouncer” to ensure people paid their charity contributions on the way in!

Ken was also a memorable quiz master at the Shutford village hall where he was able to show-off his public speaking skills, and sense of humour.

During his time owning the cottage, there were many years Ken spent living abroad in Japan, Oman, Brazil & Thailand. Out of all of these, Japan was by far his favourite. He fell in love with the food, culture, lifestyle and of course the people. His first placement was as COO for a joint venture with BT. He returned a number of years later, when he then met his wife Xiang.

In his spare time, Ken was also a keen runner for much of his life, completing 2 marathons in London, and then one in Tokyo after he had beaten Cancer the first time.

He later became a member of Hash House Harriers and joined clubs all around the world, first in Oman, then Tokyo, followed by Algarve where he had a second home and finally in Oxfordshire most notably with the Bicester Hashers. It is a tradition for every Hasher to be nominated a nickname. Ken's was "King Kok" as decided upon by the first group he ever ran with out in Oman.

Ken was also a real family man. As well as his 3 brothers; Freddie, Raymond and Paul with many nieces and nephews, there are also 3 children: Adrian, Rowland & Alice and 7 grandchildren; Lola, Tabitha, Henry, Otilie, Alexander, Edward & Eliza. His youngest daughter Alice attends Shennington CofE School where Ken also played a very active role as one of the Governors.

John Finnegan was born in the county of Neath in Southern Ireland on 3 January 1931. He came from quite a large family, but unfortunately lost his Mother and a sister at quite a young age. He always said: "he went to High School on top of a hill". He left Ireland at around 15 yrs of age and came to England to work at a Stud Farm looking after horses.

He was called up to join the army and spent time in Cyprus and Egypt. During his time in Egypt, he was driving a truck and came across a road block, he was impatient and went through. Unfortunately, for him, the road block was put in place as a Duke of Edinburgh was visiting and John met the Duke head on – it cost him dearly, the Duke ordered him to be put under house arrest (not quite sure of the punishment)!

He met Vera and they were together for many years, unfortunately she died 29 years ago, and John has been on his own ever since. Although he took great comfort in having his son Stephen, daughter in law Georgina and grandchildren to keep an eye on him!

John eventually gained employment with Mr Roots at his Stud Farm in Alkerton and then moved to Shutford continuing to work for him for over 30 years until he retired at the age of 75 hrs.

His passions were horse racing, dominoes, and a pint (or two) or Hooky at the local. If we had to describe him in a few words – 'he didn't take life too seriously, he was very easy going, kind and had a sense of humour with a glint in his eyes and of course a No. 1 Grandad to Thomas & Peter'.

I was soon invited to join them and immediately became part of the team and a friendship developed that I have cherished and enjoyed ever since.



I soon recognised Mr Finnegan had a charming Irish personality with a mischievous sense of humour which obviously led to his popularity. This was apparent by the way he was greeted with an affectionate kiss on the cheek by many of the female customers (young and old) as they entered the bar. Occasionally, his response to some of the ladies he was more familiar with, was a ribald comment which today would be classed as politically incorrect!

All his fellow domino players were aware of his occasional loss of memory but never when it was his down. In the later years a marker was introduced and circulated to note who's down it was.

Over the last few years when he was unable to visit the pub, the dominoes continued in his home with myself and his grandsons in attendance. A 'take away' beer from the George and Dragon was always enjoyed.

In the last 10 years when I was working part time, I would pop up and see him the days I was not at work to sit and have a cup of tea, a chat and collect his bet and take it to the bookmakers.

Stanley James Gale

Born 21st April 1928, Newton Abbot, Devon

Died 19th of January 2021, Katharine House Hospice, Adderbury

Known as Jim or Jimmy all his life, youngest of 4 children.

Came from a very ordinary background – his father was an engine driver on the GWR, but he was the first in his family to go to grammar school.

Joined the RAF towards the end of the war aged 16 as an apprentice electrician and after the war was

invalided out due to TB. He was ill for a number of years and spent much time in various hospitals, where he met his wife Maija who was his nurse (at the end of WW2 the British Government arranged for Eastern European refugees to come to the UK to help rebuild the economy.

Maija, a Latvian, arrived here in early 1947 and was sent to work in a TB hospital in Salisbury.) Although very different in temperament, character and background, they fell in love and married in 1950 and the marriage lasted until her death in 2014. Their only daughter Ingrid was born in 1953.

When people talk about Jim the words they use are always – cheerful, gregarious, likes to chat!

He was a people person and spent his life working as an office manager for the building contractors Sir Robert McAlpine, mainly in and around South Wales where he lived for 45 years.

It was a job that suited him down to the ground as it entailed meeting people from all walks of life. The portacabin office on the building site was his domain where he organised everything to do with life on the site. He worked for the same company all his life until his retirement in 1991 and then took on a pastoral role visiting the company pensioners and their widows.

He retained a great affection for Wales even after he moved from Cardiff to Shutford in 1998.

Jim and his wife Maija were a quiet couple who kept themselves to themselves when they moved to Shutford, mainly due to her dislike of socialising. They liked to garden and stayed close to home apart from holidays in Europe and USA, often visiting his wife's extended family.

When she died in 2014 after a short illness, he was bereft but with some encouragement began to make friends in the village and soon became a well-loved member of the community.

He could often be seen making his way round the village chatting to anyone who wanted to talk and as he gradually became more frail, people took him under their wing and helped out as much as they could.

It was his greatest wish to be able to remain at home in his old age and with the assistance of a brilliant team of carers he was able to do that. He made many friends in Shutford and once a week went to the pub where he enjoyed a couple of pints in his special chair by the bar. For his 90th birthday nearly 3 years ago his family and friends organised a surprise party in the new village hall – an occasion he enjoyed greatly.

Although very frail at the end of his long life, he remained mentally bright as a button, alert and still enjoying the company of anyone he came across. He will be sadly missed and remembered with love and affection by everyone who knew him. There will be a memorial service at St Martin's Church in celebration of his life later this year and his ashes will be interred next to those of his wife and granddaughter Katie in Sun Rising Natural Burial Ground in Tysoe.



2021 has started quietly with a steady return to worship in church as members of our congregation are receiving their coronavirus vaccinations and feel more confident to venture out. However, some of our regular congregation are staying at home with an average of only 5 in church for Sunday Worship and 3 for Saturday Morning Prayer. Our Rector, Revd Neil supported by Revd John and Glyn have led services with some lay led ones. Music has been recorded by the St Martin`s Singers, as we are unable to sing. The church is open for private prayers on Sunday, 10.30am until about 5.00pm, but it is not obvious that anyone takes the opportunity to visit. Online services held at 6.00pm on Wednesday and Sunday will continue for those staying at home. There is also Diocesan Church at Home online Sunday worship at 10.00am.

During the coming months, we will be looking at our worship patterns, online and in church, outreach and ways we can grow our church membership. What would encourage you to come or return to church to worship or be involved with church activities? Any thoughts or ideas are always appreciated.

An online, informal, benefice meeting was held on 5th February, during which Revd Neil thanked everyone for their welcome and especially John Tattersall for his care and support. All benefice parishes shared their news. There will be a review of service provision across the benefice and pastoral care and visiting will be Revd Neil`s priority as soon as conditions allow. Recent high profile safeguarding issues were highlighted: our policies will be reviewed.

The PCC had an online meeting on 9th February, when the Annual Report and Accounts for 2020 were accepted. These will be presented to the annual meeting likely to be held in June or as soon as face to face meetings can take place. Thanks to the generosity of our regular worshippers and others we have managed to pay our way with a small surplus to help start 2021. Copies of the report and accounts will be published on the Shutford village website after the annual meeting but can be obtained from the churchwarden meanwhile.

Following the retirement of Bishop Colin Fletcher, after 20 years' service, The Venerable Gavin Collins was licenced, on 28th February, as Episcopal Vicar of the Dorchester Area pending his consecration as Bishop of Dorchester at Lambeth Palace on 14th April. Gavin was Archdeacon of the Meon in Hampshire: he studied law and became a solicitor before his ordination in 1997. The start of his ministry, as our area bishop, was delayed due to the coronavirus but he and his wife have now moved to Oxford.

During Lent, Revd Neil has led online discussion groups: Growing Together in our Christian Faith, Thursday evenings and our Lenten journey through Art on Monday evenings. The Church of England's Lent campaign – entitled God's story, Our Story - explores how Christians can share their faith with others. The Oxford Diocese has "Come and See" – an invitation to take the first steps in exploring faith – with daily readings and reflections. During the present crisis, we are encouraged to read Psalm 23, which has been a source of strength for thousands of years – why not pause and say it each day!

Coronavirus has dominated our lives for the last year but thankfully the future is looking brighter. We look forward to when we can meet up safely, whether it is in the village hall, pub, or church and restart social events and fundraising. We are grateful to everyone who has helped during these difficult times – couriers, postman, milkman, local shops and supermarkets but mostly neighbours who have kept an eye on each other. Many of us in the church community are in a vulnerable age group and, instead of being out in the community helping, have been on the receiving end of help and are grateful.

We are sad to have lost several members of the village community recently – Jim Gale, John Finnegan and Ken King, also Jean Hancock, who lived in Shutford for many years. We offer our sincere sympathy to their families.

On a brighter note, the flowers in the churchyard are blooming – a trio of yellows can be seen – celandines, primroses and Lent lilies – daffodils. Take care when visiting the church and grounds: please call and spend a few minutes quietly reflecting on recent events. People of all denominations or none are always welcome in church but remember – Hands, Face, Space!

Most of our plans for Easter are going ahead but Messy Church in Sibford on Good Friday is cancelled. We hope to see you in church on Easter Sunday morning when Revd Neil is leading worship. The Easter bunny will have brought along some chocolate eggs, along with spring flowers absent in Lent.

We have a really lovely world around us- hills and rolling landscapes dotted with sheep and trees in their season. But even after 29 years here it seems there is still discovery.

Val and I have lived a lot in Sweden where the tiny coltsfoot is always a totem of spring and people vie to find the first in flower. We have tried for years in vain to find some.



Imagine our delight now- doing Covid walks, to find three clumps in Shutford - so, we have the picture now to send to Sweden!

St. Martin's Churchyard for me is a haven of seasonal beauty, echoes of long-gone villagers though some families still going on - like the seasons - and the ivy!

Church authorities, faced with maintenance costs, now recognise the 'wild' nature suiting all kinds of life - and for me a surprise 'find.'



After a recent Sunday service, I spotted pink catkins just lit by the sun! Val is a florist, and her tree book identifies this as a Turkish Hazel! It is clearly self-seeded, still young. The book says native to central and south-east Europe and West Asia- more new warmth on nature's thermometer maybe.

The service also brought a new thought that, despite many years since my mum stuck me in the village choir age 12, through later periods of on

and off admittedly, I still have no better explanation of why we exist- despite science taking us back to a quantum soup of quarks and gluons. Science has yet no better explanation for a highly complex universe than some enormous accident! I read in 'New Scientist' (my son-in-law's) of quantum particles experts ever more bewildered by finding things like matter can be in two places at the same time - like God at Christmas and Easter? A Chipping Norton Church last year apologised: "Sorry the church is closed.....but the tomb was empty!"

Covid has seen for perhaps the first time the entire world united in caring for others - across politics, wealth, sport, entertainment, young and old, gender, media, culture, across Faiths or none. Sikhs and Muslims cooked and made meals for *any* needy people in their neighbourhoods.

Security and safety...Travels with my memories by Debbie Pitt

Whenever I travelled my family and friends asked me if I ever worried about my safety – I have been to some insecure places including few in a State of Emergency – the killing of the Nepalese royal family, unrest in Bangladesh and the first time women could vote in Afghanistan. Here are a few more that I remember.

Nigeria has a record of aid workers being kidnapped for ransom and when I was working for a very well known, and rich organisation, who were very strict on security. I received two phone calls every day to ensure I was OK. If I had been kidnapped, the key phrase I was to say when they asked how things were was “I have had a very boring day”.

As I was not being allowed out of the hotel for the 10 days (no alcohol was served either and veggie food very limited!) by 8th day I was indeed having a very boring day. You can imagine how I really had to concentrate on what I said when I got the security call. The last thing I wanted to happen was for the organisation to send out the SAS crashing through the windows on ropes to ‘rescue’ me.

Papua New Guinea is another country not known for its safety. As I left for Heathrow, someone asked if I had had the full security briefing and had been given my rape alarm – I had neither given to me.

But once there the people were so friendly and kind and I never felt threatened and would wander round the town, going to the local markets and chatting to people.

I was lucky not to have had to travel on a local bus as they were often stopped by bandits, referred to as ‘rascals’, who did steal and worse.

It wasn't just my safety that I remember.

The traffic in most Asian countries can be frenetic as well as colourful.

Often, I saw motorbikes with the pillion holding a huge sheet of glass or an oversize television.



The rickshaws in Bangladesh could be completely full of bananas, bed rolls, furniture etc.

In Vietnam it wasn't unusual to see a whole family – parents and at least 4 children and possibly their supper in the form of a pig tied to the back, all on a motorbike. In the end you stopped worrying about it and I never saw a crash in all the places I have been to.





Shutford Book Club

Easy and yummy Ginger biscuits



Oven 180c/ 350f, fan 160c or gas mark 4

Cooking time 15 minutes

Ingredients

300g Plain Flour

225g Sugar

1tsp Bicarbonate of soda

1 ½ tsp baking powder

2 tsp ground ginger

170g butter

1tbsp golden syrup

2tbsp milk

1. Put your oven on to 180c/ 350f, fan 160c or gas mark 4.
2. Lightly grease a large flat baking tray.
3. Combine all dry ingredients into a large bowl.
4. Melt butter and golden syrup on a low heat.
5. Pour in melted ingredients to dry ingredients along with the milk and mix into a firm dough.
6. Using your hands form the dough into biscuits, place them onto the tray allowing for them expand. I usually get about 8-10 on my tray, you may like to make them larger or smaller to your taste.
7. Place in the middle of the oven for about 15 minutes or until they are golden brown.

Enjoy with a mug of hot tea or coffee with family and friends (when we can). These biscuits don't last long in my house, but they fill the home with a lovely ginger smell and put smiles on everyone's face. Enjoy.






