





Shutford Book Club


The Shutford Book Club normally meets on the last Monday of each month in Shutford Village Hall 7:30 pm. This is being done virtually.

Incredible Cookies

This is a great basic cookie recipe to use up the random bags of dried fruit you might have in your store cupboard, it's very forgiving!

Basic cookie recipe - makes 12-20

- 100g butter or margarine
- 225g sugar (I use brown sugar but anything goes)
- 225g self raising flour (or plain flour + 1/4tsp baking powder)
- 1 large egg
- Added extras such as chocolate chips or nuts etc

Preheat the oven to 170 C (fan). Cream the butter and sugar till fluffy, and then beat in the egg. Sift in the flour and mix together thoroughly - this will be quite a stiff mixture. Then add your extras such as chocolate chips. Grease a baking tray or line with baking parchment and spoon your cookie dough out in even dollops and flatten it down a bit with the back of a spoon, leaving space for them to spread. Bake for around 10-15 minutes depending how chewy or crunchy you like your cookies, but they should be golden brown. They will be quite soft at first, so leave on the tray for a minute or so to firm up then transfer to a wire rack. For big cookies use a tablespoon - this makes about 12, or for smaller ones use a teaspoon for around 20 cookies.

Variations

- Try half a cup of oats and 50g of sultanas and a big heaped tablespoon of crunchy peanut butter
- Swap out 50g of flour for cocoa powder and 1 tsp of ginger, chop up some crystalised ginger and add a 100g bag of dark chocolate chips
- White chocolate chips with a good handful of dried cranberries

Pollution in Shutford Stream

Some readers may have watched the Panorama programme (aired on 12 April 2021) "The River Pollution Scandal" which highlighted the significant deterioration of many English and Welsh rivers and waterways over the past few years.

There is widespread evidence of underreporting of pollution incidents, indicating that the Water Companies see self-reporting as an opportunity for unscrupulous behaviour rather than as a responsibility to be exercised on behalf of wider society.

The excellent new interactive map (see 'The Rivers Trust' website) shows the extent of this problem very close to home: In 2020, Thames Water's Sewage Treatment Works at Shutford released untreated sewage into Shutford Stream on 114 occasions, for a total of 1530 hours. This is up from 79 occasions (just under 800 hours) in 2019. In 2020 this was the equivalent of untreated sewage being released into our local stream 24 hours a day on an uninterrupted basis, for just over 2 months! The data shows that Shutford Sewage Treatment Plant is one of the worst in the entire country.

Many of us probably have childhood memories of looking down into the clear waters of our local stream, our curiosity and interest perhaps aroused by the fleeting glimpse of a red-finned Roach, a small silvery shoal of Dace or Minnows, or even a shy Brown Trout breaking the surface for a fly. We probably admired dipping Swallows or circling bats on a summer's evening. I don't want the beauty of these things to be lost to our children and grandchildren and we have a moral duty to protect them. I simply cannot understand how the management of a supposedly reputable business like Thames Water can think it is in any way ethical to destroy mile upon mile of delicate ecosystems in order to generate marginally greater profitability or as a substitute for effective site management.

If you are interested in registering your disapproval, here are a few suggestions:

WASP. (Windrush Against Sewage Pollution) has been very active in trying to save the once beautiful Windrush River.

OFWAT. Complaining to the regulator is something that Thames Water actively dislikes.

Contacting Thames Water directly. The new CEO is Sarah Bentley (sarah.bentley@thameswater.co.uk)

OMERS. This Canadian pension fund is now the majority shareholder in Thames Water. They have ESG guidelines which TW is likely to be violating.

Victoria Prentis MP was not a supporter of the 130 cross party MPs supporting Philip Dunne MP's Private Member's Bill which addressed the sewage pollution issue before it was guillotined.

The Water Companies were privatised in 1989 with zero debt. They have paid out 57bn pounds in dividends since 1991, largely funded by 48bn pounds in new debt. Thames Water is one of the biggest



offenders, taking on 11.7bn pounds in new debt over the period and paying enormous executive packages. It is time that this polluting gravy train was derailed by proper regulatory oversight.

21/030/1	Raw Sewage Discharge – The owner of Wroxton Mill wanted to warn the village that raw sewage is entering the stream. This has been reported to Thames Water and a survey is being completed and sent to the Council for the Protection of Rural England. It is believed that the sewage may be coming from a leak further up towards Shenington or Balscote rather than the Sewage Treatment Plant.
21/030/2	Industrial Units in West Street– Some residents have complained about noise and lorries staying over-night. These were passed on to Brown & Co who passed them on to the current tenant. The tenant has advised the Parish Council that he is mindful of the residents, tries to minimise evening noise and weekend work and that the lorry had broken down and couldn't be moved until repaired. The Parish Council urges the residents and tenant of the industrial unit to work together and discuss any issues.
21/030/3	Bonfire on Plot Road Allotment – A complaint has been received from a member of the public about a bonfire on one of the Plot Road allotments. Allotment holders are permitted to burn cuttings and weeds on their allotments. This is not a regular event and the situation will be monitored. The clerk will speak to the complainant and the allotment holder.
21/031 21/031/1	Planning: 21/00392/F – Holywell House – Permitted by CDC 1/04/2021
21/032	Any Other Business:
21/032/1	Homeworking Allowance for Clerk – The Clerk asked to be paid the HMRC recognised Homeworking Allowance. This was discussed but no decision taken.
21/032/2	OCC Lost Footpaths – OCC had contacted the Parish Council with a map of odd bits of footpaths asking for them to be reviewed. These have been reviewed and it was agreed not to reinstate lost footpaths.
21/032/3	Stones jutting from verge near Monastry Farmhouse – Some stones are jutting from the verge along the High Street and caused a puncture on a passing car. IOt was agreed that the Clerk would report this to OCC Highways.
21/032/4	Testing of the Tyte Spring water at the pond – It was suggested that this could be tested to ascertain the quality of the water. It was agreed that the cost of this will be investigated.

Shutford Parish Council Annual Report for year ended 31 March 2021.

The last year has been unusual and challenging for all of us in the village, and beyond. As a Parish Council we have not had any of our usual face to face meetings in the village hall. We have held meetings remotely, with villagers able to dial in. Thanks to Ashley for setting that up.

We have had various changes in councillors during the last year or so, and I would like to formally thank Debbie Pitt, Carolyn Rann and Tom Parish for everything they did while on the council. Debbie was a very dedicated and energetic chair and has been a hard act to follow. I am still learning and grateful that she is there to support when needed. Ashley also provides support as vice Chair. Chris Hall, Stephen Barnes and Paul Huewen have joined the Parish Council and each of them have picked up specific areas of responsibility.

In many respects it has inevitably been a guiet year. As a council, we have:

- Continued to manage the allotments in terms of rent collection and dealing with new
 allotment holders. Some asbestos sheeting was removed and and another water
 container installed. We currently have a short waiting list of people wanting to take on
 an allotment. Paul has been fantastic at picking all of this up.
- We will not be cutting the grass verge in the Rickyard in order to leave this for wild flowers.
- The play equipment on the Dairyground has been maintained and inspected.
- Vegetation was cleared from a wall on the Dairyground and some work was carried out to clear and mark the footpath on one side of the Dairyground. We will need to keep on top of that.
- We will be installing a bug hotel in a corner of the Dairyground and tidying up the area round the bench near the play equipment. The Tesco grant will be used to buy and install a sign for the bug hotel.
- A number of potholes in the village have been reported and fixed.
- We have drafted an Emergency Plan for the village, which is on the website. This will need to continue to be updated.
- There have been various planning applications which we have assessed and passed on our recommendations to Cherwell. Thanks to Chris for picking up this area.
- Stephen Barnes has picked up the village hall rep role.

In terms of finances, we have ended the year with a small surplus and with cash reserves of about 2 years' income. This is prudent and in line with recommendations and provides us with some reserves if needed. The precept for this year (21/22) was therefore not increased. Villagers may have seen a small percentage increase in the precept in their council tax demand. This is a calculation issue relating to the number of properties in certain bands. The total income that we receive as a Parish Council is unchanged.

Our accounts were audited by Debbie Pitt (as she is no longer on the council). She has noted that everything was in order and has made some suggestions for tightening some of our processes. Thanks to Debbie for carrying out a rigorous audit, and to David for keeping our records in order.

With the easing of coronavirus restrictions and the roll out of the vaccination programme, there has been a steady return to church for worship, with most of our core congregation worshipping at some time each month.

Online worship continues online at 6.00pm on Wednesday and Sunday for those unable to come to church. St Martin's Church is open on Sunday from 10.30am until 6.00pm for private prayer. However, the Oxford Diocesan Online Church at Home services will finish on 23rd May: special thanks to all the clergy and lay people who have planned and broadcast these services during the past year.

Advent groups met as scheduled, and services held as planned. Mothering Sunday was celebrated with an afternoon Family Service at which potted primroses were distributed to members of the congregation: flowers were also delivered to those unable to be in church. The annual procession of palms around Epwell could not take place this year but instead a service was held in Swalcliffe. Palm crosses were displayed in church and delivered to members of our core congregation in Shutford.

A Benefice Service was held each day during Holy Week across the benefice. Our Easter Sunday service had the largest congregation for more than a year.

The church was beautifully decorated with spring flowers and chocolate eggs were available for everyone in church. It was good to welcome Christopher and Sophie, with Christopher's mum Janice, to church to hear their Banns of Marriage read for the first time. Residents of Shutford, they will be married at the end of May in Epwell, Sophie's home village. We wish them well for their married life together.

The church bells were tolled 365 times at noon on The National Day of Reflection on 23rd March and the church tower illuminated that evening. The bells were also tolled on 10th April, 99 times, to remember HRH Prince Philip and the church tower illuminated on 17th April the evening of his funeral. Our service on 11th April started with a time of reflection and prayers for him.

Christian Aid Week was held 10th – 16th May and concentrated on raising money to help families to survive drought brought on by the climate crisis. Although a door to door collection in Shutford was not possible again this year, collecting envelopes were delivered to many properties with an option of leaving donations at a designated address or by donating online at caweek.org or by calling 08080 006006. All donations will be gratefully received.

Reverend Neil Bowler was inducted and installed as our rector on 13th May, Ascension Day, by our Associate Archdeacon Reverend Canon David Tyler at a service in Broughton. Although, Rev Neil was licensed in January by The Bishop of Oxford via the internet, the induction, which was delayed because of coronavirus restrictions, completed the legal process of his appointment.

We hope to have the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, with refreshments, in Shutford Village Hall on Tuesday, 6th July at 7.30pm.

At this meeting, the 2020 church annual report and accounts will be presented, and churchwardens and church council members elected for the coming year. With a small loyal congregation working hard to keep the church available for everyone, it is more important than ever that younger villagers become involved with church life to help spread the workload and financial costs. Like many organisations, retired members of our community play lead roles in the church and at present there are no obvious people to replace them when they wish to stand down.

Thank you to all who make regular donations to the church, support the Illuminate and Celebrate Initiative and respond to other appeals. Social fundraising also plays an important part in village life and supports charities, including the church, so we look forward to their return in the summer.

The churchyard early spring flowers have faded, but some cowslips are still flowering. The large cherry tree is in full bloom, with lilac bushes and other summer flowers starting to put on a good show. The picture in the March/April Shutford News – The Churchyard Yew Tree was not – the tree is in the north east part of the churchyard and is not the southside tree. The yew does need some attention: the removal of brambles and ivy from its branches. Areas of grass are left uncut until later in the year to encourage the wildflowers to bloom, although grasses can dominate.

Some grass is cut to form paths around the churchyard but please be careful of uneven ground when visiting. Although swallows have been seen in the village, they have not yet returned to the church porch. Food and drink ... Travels with my memories by Debbie Pitt



I am very lucky as, apart from being a fish eating vegetarian, I can eat most food and will have a go at trying most things (crunchy insects

included), but not tried the mice that kids catch in the fields and sell by the roadside as a tasty kebab. Of course we all love a food market and in Asian they are amazing as you can buy at least 6 different types of eggs, exotic fruit, live frogs and endless chickens. Markets in some rural places you will only get women selling the one crop they happen to grow that week – peanuts or tomatoes etc


My experience with experimenting with eggs is one I don't wish to try again. I was on an overnight train in Vietnam and in the morning, breakfast



comes round on a trolley.

Choosing a boiled egg and disregarding the strange looks from a local family sitting opposite me, I tucked into a strange coloured egg. To my horror, when I opened it, it was a dead chick with a few feathers on – apparently you can buy eggs of different ages – never to be tried again.

I have to say, I am rather partial to a drop of vodka and where better than the ex-soviet country of Georgia. On my last evening there I was taken out by the office staff and was so impressed with the knowledge of the men who asked which farm certain cheeses came from and rejected the ones that



didn't come up to their standard. Of course, every meal means drinking vodka – and toasting continually. I was determined to try and keep my intake to a minimum as I was flying the next day but all I can say, I don't think I managed, after all, it is rude not to toast

whatever they were toasting in Russian!

My other drinking memory is in the South Pacific. The drink is called Kava and the drinking of it is all wrapped up in a ceremony. In Fiji, it is a community ceremony but in Vanuatu it is completely different. There are 'Kava bars' (shacks) and it is sold by the 'shell' or 'half shell' (coconut or sea shell I never discovered). You take your shell, stand facing a wall away from everyone and you must drink it down in one go - the taste is *so* revolting that you don't want it in your mouth for any length of time! You might wonder why they drink it but after the tingling of your lips, your mouth goes numb and apparently after a few shells, you relax – I never got that far!


